Subject: Advancing the District's Role in Addressing the Healthcare Needs of Black

Communities in the Coachella Valley

Background:

- Health inequities among racial minorities are pronounced, persistent, and pervasive. Racism may be one cause of these inequities as studies find that individuals who report experiencing racism exhibit worse health than people who do not report it.
- The Desert Healthcare District acknowledges this. On June 3, 2020, the District released a statement against racism, oppression and inequality in all of its forms, and in solidarity with the black community, especially in light of recent deaths of black Americans in the hands of law enforcement.
- To make progress, we have to shift the conditions that hold a problem in place. And doing this means building a healthcare system that focuses on equity and inclusion, a healthcare system that focuses on the needs of all our residents, including, and especially, the needs of our communities of color.
- To better understand these conditions, and to create a long-term plan to address it, the District commissioned a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) and a 10-year Health Improvement Plan (HIP). This work is ongoing and expected to be completed in the first half of 2021.
- In 2014, the District supported a place-based initiative that included the
 historically black neighborhood of Desert Highland Gateway (DHG); a
 Community Health Assessment (DHG-CHA) was established, and the District
 supported the training of four community members through the Loma Linda
 University Institute for Community Partnerships and El Sol Neighborhood
 Education Center -Community Health Worker (Promotores de Salud) Academy.
- This work led to the expansion of a community advisory committee commprised of DHG community members and other key stakeholders to guide and support the work of the community health workers and the community beyond the initial placed-based intervention.
- This resulted in the development of a Collective Impact Community Model Plan for a second phase of the placed-based intervention, which focused on five primary objectives:
 - Health Navigation Program

- Low Cost Health Care Access
- Job Placement Programming
- At-Risk Youth Programming
- Vocational Training Resources
- The community has demonstrated the health and academic disparities faced by DHG students in comparison to their counterparts.
- The community established an African American Parent Advisory Council at the Palm Springs Unified School District and has continued to elevate facts about their community, including that its location keeps it isolated from accessing essential amenities such as grocery stores and healthcare services.
- But more resources are needed.

Recommended Response

- There is \$432,595 in unallocated funds from the current fiscal year.
- Staff recommends allocating these funds to the Desert Healthcare Foundation to advance the District's role in addressing the healthcare needs of black communities in the Coachella Valley.
- The allocation would include a \$332,595 fund to address access to
 healthcare, including but not limited to primary care, behavioral health, and
 navigation services; and a \$100,000 allocation toward a scholarship fund to
 Expanding Racial Diversity in the Health Profession Workforce by
 supporting black students pursuing health careers.
- The Foundation will invite members of the community to help design how these funds will be deployed.

Recommendation: To approve \$432,595 to be allocated to the Desert Healthcare Foundation to advance the District's Role in Addressing the Healthcare Needs of Black Communities in the Coachella Valley.

Fiscal Impact: \$432,595 from the remaining grantmaking budget (FY2019-2020).

Subject: Homelessness Update

Background:

- In May of 2016, the Board approved a \$2 million allocation to a homelessness collective fund and challenged the nine desert cities to match the District's efforts and allocation
- In 2019 the Board approved another \$1 million to the collective fund, bringing the total to \$3 million. At the May 2020 meeting, the board allocated an additional \$500,000 to the Homelessness Fund.
- Currently, there is \$1.2 million in the Homelessness Collective Fund.
- To further prevent homelessness in Coachella Valley, DHCD approved a \$500,000 allocation to Lift to Rise to startup a rental assistance program, bringing the total allocations to homelessness to \$4 million.
- From the CVAG matching fund that the District initiated with its homelessness initiative collective fund, DHCD pays for 0.75FTE for the salary of Greg Rodriquez to implement and managed Coachella Valley Homelessness Engagement and Action Response Team (CVHEART).
- The following update was prepared by District staff and Greg Rodriguez.

Updates regarding homelessness activities

COVID 19 Homeless Response

- From the onset of the COVID 19 pandemic, the Desert Healthcare District took a proactive approach to address the possible impact on the Coachella Valley's homeless population and allocated a \$75,000 emergency fund for Homeless and Refugee Shelters (Coachella Valley Rescue Mission (CVRM), Martha's Village & Kitchen, and the Galilee Center).
- The County of Riverside and Coachella Valley Homelessness Engagement &
 Action Response Team (CVHEART) also took an early proactive approach to
 address the possible impact on the Coachella Valley's homeless population.
 Shelters and service providers implemented social distancing, sanitation and
 other measures recommended by the State and County.
- In an effort to increase the social distancing for the overnight clients at the Palm Springs cooling center, its location changed from the Boxing Club to the Palm Springs High School gym. We (the County) were able to secure funding

- for these operations through the County's COVID 19 response. The school district will need the operations relocated by June 30^{th} , and as of this writing, we are securing a new location. County funding through the CARES Act will remain at least through the end of September.
- Before the Governor announced his Project Room Key program, Riverside County was already embarking on a hotel/motel housing program for homeless residents. Once again, CARES Act dollars are being utilized to provide temporary rooms. The County has secured 1,503 rooms and has placed 515 individuals. In the Coachella Valley there have been 170 individuals placed including 76 in Desert Hot Springs, 60 in Palm Springs, and 34 in Indio. In addition to housing, medical care, and food, County workers are working with service providers to establish exit plans for these individuals into permanent housing.
- Food banks also responded to the COVID 19 crisis and its potential effect on homelessness. In addition to the District's funding of \$401,000 for FIND Food Bank, the County, and various cities worked with Food Now and FIND Food Bank to increase food distribution sites throughout the Valley. In addition to the current County senior feeding programs, the County fully adopted the State of California's Great Plates Program, working with local restaurants to provide three meals a day to homebound or vulnerable seniors. 2,011 clients were matched Countywide with 34 restaurants participating. Coachella Valley had the most restaurants participating.
- Also, the District funded Mizell and Joclyn Senior Centers' Meal on Wheels program.

Rental Assistance Fund

- To further prevent homelessness in the Coachella Valley, the Desert Healthcare District approved a \$500,000 allocation for Lift to Rise to start up a rental assistance fund.
- The fund was matched by \$1.5million from other funders and an \$11.5million allocation from the County of Riverside, for a total of \$13.5million.
- On Monday June 16th, the County of Riverside, announced the \$33 million rental assistance program sponsored by District 4 Supervisor, V. Manuel Perez.
- Rental Assistance funds will be used to assist families with up to \$3,500.
- The County's \$33million allocation will be managed by Lift to Rise and United Way of the Inland Valley. Lift to Rise will manage the program in Coachella Valley, and it will include additional communities, from Beumont to Blythe.
- Information and the application in both English and Spanish can be located at www.unitedlift.org. On the first day of the program's launch over 1,000 applications were submitted with 60% of those coming from the Coachella Valley.

CV Housing First

 CVHEART, in conjunction with the Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG), continues to operate the CV Housing First program. In

- the beginning of 2020, it updated the program design. Its implementation now includes more strategic and coordinated outreach with public safety from local cities to increase the relationships with the Sheriffs in local cities and unincorporated areas.
- On February 3rd, CVAG/CVHEART worked with Path of Life to move their operations hub to the new Palm Springs Access Center located at the Boxing Club. Clients can drop in to receive assistance accessing services and programs. Public Safety can also bring clients for services. Staff have staggered their times to be able to, not only staff the access center, but continue to do their Valley wide outreach. Path of Life has also been able to hire more staff that are based locally.
- The Access Center operates from 7 AM to 7 PM Monday through Friday. 151 unduplicated clients have been served between February and May. Services provided include emergency housing and shelter referrals, connection to benefits, accessing documents, and linkage to housing.
- In addition to the aforementioned Project Room Key, CVHEART/CVAG was able to secure additional hotel/motel units to add crisis stabilization units to the stock Path of Life currently has under the CV Housing First program. Currently the CV Housing First stock consists of 26 units that include 15 rental properties and 11 motel rooms. The motel room occupants are receiving full case management services and working towards permanent placement. Path of Life is continuing its search for additional units for the CV Housing First program.

CV 100

- In 2019, CVAG received a Homeless Emergency Aid Program (HEAP) grant, to implement a program previously called "25 Familiar Faces". In January, under the management of Tom Cox with CVAG, the program was renamed to "CV 100". This program is a coordinated effort with CVHEART, CVAG, and service providers working with public safety agencies. These public service agencies include working with the outreach teams contracted with the County by Palm Springs and Palm Desert.
- CVAG/CVHEART is working to identify 100 of our most chronically homeless
 in the Valley that utilize medical and public safety services to a high degree,
 commonly referred to as frequent flyers. Clients identified are worked with
 through an intense case management basis to access needed services,
 especially in the areas of behavioral health, substance use and medical
 treatments. To date, 7 unsheltered residents have been helped off the street.
 While this number may seem low, it is important to note that these clients
 are often the most difficult to house.

Summer Overnight Cooling Centers

 As referenced above, the Palm Springs overnight cooling center is still in operation are looking to replicate last year's cooling centers in Desert Hot Springs and Cathedral City. We thought we would be able to secure CARES Act funding for those but have found out we cannot utilize that resource. We have locations, and CVRM can operate, but we don't have the funding. This may be an area the District can assist in.

Palm Springs HHAP Allocation

- The Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) program was signed into law on July 31, 2019 by Governor Gavin Newsom and is being administered by the California Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC). HHAP is a \$650 million one-time block grant that provides local jurisdictions with funds to support regional coordination and expand or develop local capacity to address their immediate homelessness challenges.
- The City of Palm Springs was allocated \$10 million from HHAP funding. They
 commissioned Barbara Poppe to do a needs analysis and recommendations
 for allocation which were presented publicly in early 2020.
- CVHEART is undergoing meetings that began on June 17th to discuss prioritization and the RFP process.

Recommendation: Information only
