Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation to received \$1.2 million from the County of Riverside and \$500,00 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.
- Grant awards have been provided to several community-based organizations to expand their current COVID-19 response programs/services or develop new community-based outreach strategies, that include culturally and linguistically appropriate approaches using social media, print media, podcasts, PSA's, or testimonials. The recipients of the grant awards include:

- Alianza Coachella Valley	- El Sol Neighborhood Educational Center
- Galilee Center	- Líderes Campesinas
- Pueblo Unido	- TODEC
 Visión y Compromiso 	- Youth Leadership Institute

• The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation have established and lead The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faithbased organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

Update:

• One of the primary objectives of the CVEC was to increase the number of COVID-19 screening events in underserved areas and within areas with high positivity rates of COVID-19. The CVEC has coordinated multiple COVID-19 testing events that have been hosted throughout the Coachella Valley and beyond, they include:

- At each screening event, every participant is provided with a goodie bag that includes culturally and linguistically appropriate educational materials, along with face masks, hand sanitizers, and disinfecting wipes.
- Any individual that has a positive COVID-19 test receives a phone call from a Promotoras (community health worker) to ensure they are connected to vital safety-net programs and services, such as transportation, housing assistance, cash assistance, food banks, healthcare services, etc. Also, Promotoras speak to the individual about the importance of contact tracing and what to expect when they receive the call from the contact tracing teams.
- Promotoras from partner agencies, such as El Sol NEC and Vision y Compromiso have played a vital role in various facets of the CVEC, and much of the successful rollout of the COVID-19 screening events and educational materials can be attributed to them. They have been trained to pre-register participants using the Curative QR codes at each event; register participants using the Curative website and provide them with their COVID-19 specimen collection bag; provide instructions and supervise the COVID-19 test.
- Promotoras also serve as operators for an established 1-800 helpline, whose purpose is to assist community members to identify COVID-19 testing locations, pre-register for COVID-19 testing events hosted by the CVEC, and provide referrals to safety-net programs and services.
- With the help of Promotoras, educational materials such as, flyers, PSA's, and community resource guides were developed in various languages including Spanish and Purepecha, a native language of indigenous people of the state of Michoacan in Mexico.
- Educational materials, along with more than 20,000 face masks, 50,000 hand sanitizers, and 10,000 alcohol disinfecting wipes have been disseminated by Promotoras at COVID-19 screening events, community-based outreach, and other community events.
- The partnerships and infrastructure developed through the CVEC will position the DHCD/F to assist the Riverside County Department of Public Health in their efforts to successfully rollout the COVID-19 vaccine to farmworkers, underserved communities and the general public.

Fiscal Impact:

Riverside County Contract: \$1,200,000, of which 20% (\$240,000) will support/compensate DHCF staff.

Public Health Institute grant: \$500,000, of which \$45,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff

Subject: Grant #1034 – City of Palm Springs – no cost grant extension for seven (7) months

The Desert Healthcare Foundation awarded a \$225,000 grant to the City of Palm Springs in December 2019 to support the Homeless Mental Health Housing Crisis Teams and Wrap Around Services. The term of the grant was from December 1, 2019 through November 30, 2020.

The Request for the No-cost Extension: The City of Palm Springs is requesting a no-cost grant extension until June 30, 2012. The City anticipates a surplus balance due to unanticipated CARES Act Funding made available to the City which had to be spent by December 31, 2020. The City would like to utilize the grant savings to extend the timeframe for the City to provide homeless outreach services.

<u>GRANTS STAFF TEAM recommendation</u>: The Board of Directors approve a seven (7) month no-cost grant extension, extending the grant agreement through June 30, 2021.

DESERT HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION GRANT EXTENSION AGREEMENT

This agreement is entered into by the Desert Healthcare Foundation ("FOUNDATION"), a California nonprofit public benefit corporation and City of Palm Springs ("RECIPIENT") and is effective upon execution by both parties.

1. Grant Extension

Purpose and Use of Extension: City of Palm Springs is hereby granted a seven (7) month extension to the original grant agreement approved on November 26, 2019 for Homelessness Crisis Team and Wrap Around Services

No additional funds will be disbursed. RECIPIENT shall use remaining dollars, if any, from original grant amount of \$225,000 during extension period.

2. <u>Term of Agreement</u>
