Staff Recommendation:

Consideration to approve a Consulting Services Agreement with MYDuarte Strategy Group for development and implementation of an online registration tool for vaccination events of the CV Equity Collaborative.

Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap in services and/or outreach.
- COVID-19 vaccine events have increased dramatically and the CVEC once again finds
 itself leading efforts to increase access to underserved communities in the Eastern
 Coachella Valley, specifically farmworker communities, and now educators and food
 service workers.
- With the increase of vaccination events coordinated and hosted by the CVEC, where hundreds of community members participate, a need for an online registration system arose to meet the high demand of available appointments to ensure community members have access to multiple registration methods, which includes on-site registration, online, and walk-ins. The development and management of the on-line registration system will increase the access of the COVID-19 vaccine to District residents.
- Staff has identified a consultant, MYDuarte Strategy Group, to provide the development and implementation of the online registration system and to provide support at the vaccination events.
- Staff recommends approval of the Consulting Service Agreement with MYDuarte Strategy Group.

• At the April 13, 2021 Finance & Administration Committee meeting, the Committee approved the request and recommended forwarding to the Board for consideration of approval.

Fiscal Impact:

Expense Not to exceed \$25,000. The expense is covered by the CARES/ELC funds provided by Riverside County.

CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between Desert Healthcare District ("District"), a public agency organized and operating pursuant to California Health and Safety Code section 32000 et seq., and MyDuarte Strategy Group, ("Consultant") as follows:

R-E-C-I-T-A-L-S

- 1. District would like to retain the professional services of Consultant to:
- Assit in managing large scale vacciantion events.
- Will build and bundle HIPPA compliant technology operating systems to help streamline day of checkin processes which is a separate from process from online and on-site registration systems.
- Will manage online event registration for all events including creating Event Communication packages.
- Will coordinate with Rite Aid Pharmacy Regional to streamline Day of process and sharing of electronic data to save time and resources of print materials.
- Will coordinate event mass communications systems to communication Day of and last minute details via text message or email to all registered guests with 1st and 2nd dose details.
- Will collaborate with District Staff, manage Day of events and troubleshoots to alleviate bottlenecks or any other issues that arise.
- Does not require the District to provide a computer or any software.
- 2. Consultant has worked with the University of California: Office of the President to organize and coordinate large-scale events that included the on-line registration systems, and supervision of the event staff. In addition, the Consultant has also managed political campaigns for local elected officials, special districts, and unions. necessary to provide the professional services ("Services") as more specifically outlined in the attached Exhibit "A" ("Consultant Proposal").

C-O-V-E-N-A-N-T-S

1. CONSULTANT'S SERVICES.

- 1.1 <u>Services</u>. Consultant shall provide all labor, materials, equipment, and incidentals necessary to fully and adequately provide the District with the professional services described in the Consultant Proposal. All Services shall be performed by Consultant to the reasonable satisfaction of the District.
- 1.2 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. In performing the Services, Consultant shall, at all times comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, codes, ordinances, and orders of

every kind whatsoever issued, adopted, or enacted by any federal, state, or local governmental body having jurisdiction over the Services.

- 1.3 <u>Performance Standard</u>. Consultant shall perform the Services with efficiency and diligence and shall execute the Services in accordance with the standards of Consultant's profession, generally described as that degree of skill and care ordinarily exercised by professionals providing similar services as Consultant practicing in California.
- 1.4 <u>District and Foundation's Representative</u>. For purposes of this Agreement, the District and Foundation's Representative shall be District's Chief Executive Officer Conrado Barzaga, located at 1140 North Indian Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, CA 92262. All amendments to this Agreement shall be approved by the District Board.

2. FEES AND PAYMENTS.

- 2.1 <u>Compensation for Services</u>. For the full and satisfactory performance of the Services, District shall compensate Consultant a Not To Exceed amount of \$25,000, plus customary expenses.
- 2.2 <u>Invoices</u>. Consultant shall deliver monthly invoices to the District no later than the 10th day of each month for Services.
- 2.3 Payment. The District shall remit payment for all amounts due to Consultant within thirty (30) days after receipt of invoices; provided, however, in the event District disputes any portion of Consultant's invoice, it shall timely pay any undisputed amounts invoiced and notify Consultant within thirty (30) days of its receipt of the invoice of the specifics of any disputed amounts. The parties shall expeditiously resolve the subject of any disputed amounts by way of negotiation or, if necessary, mediation. Any such dispute shall not relieve Consultant of its obligation to continue diligently performing the Services.

3. TERM; TERMINATION.

- 3.1 <u>Term</u>. The term of this Agreement shall run from the date this Agreement is fully executed until May 31, 2021 subject to Section 1.3 above or the District's right to terminate sooner for convenience.
- 3.2 <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. District may, at any time in the exercise of its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part, with or without cause, by providing notice to Consultant of its intention to terminate the Agreement for convenience. So long as Consultant is not in default under this Agreement at the time of such termination, District shall pay Consultant for all Services incurred upto and including the date of termination.

4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

District has retained Consultant to provide, and Consultant shall perform, the Services as an independent contractor maintaining exclusive direction and control over its employees; and, no personnel utilized by Consultant to perform the Services are employees of the District.

5. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS.

All deliverables and other documents generated by Consultant in the performance of the Services, including all work papers, work-in-progress, designs, documents, data, ledgers, journals and reports prepared by Consultant as a part of Consultant's Services shall belong to and be subject to the sole ownership and use of the District. The provisions of this Paragraph 5 shall survive any termination of this Agreement.

6. INDEMNIFICATION.

Consultant agrees to indemnify and hold the District and Foundation, its governing body, officers, employees, representatives, agents, successors and assigns (collectively the District/Foundation Indemnities), harmless from and against any and all losses, liabilities, claims, causes of action or costs and expenses of whatever nature or kind, incurred or suffered by the District or the District/Foundation Indeminities including indemnity claims arising by reason of any personal injury of any person or property loss, loss of use, or damage, to the extent the same arise out of or in connection with the negligent act(s) or omission(s), recklessness, or willful misconduct of Consultant, its officers, employees, subcontractors, or representatives, relating to the performance of the services outlined in this Agreement.

7. NOTICE.

All notices to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed effective upon receipt when personally served or two days after mailing by certified, return receipt requested, to the following addresses:

- 8.1 <u>Venue</u>. Venue shall lie only in the federal or state courts nearest to the City of Palm Springs, in the County of Riverside, State of California.
- 8.2 <u>Modification</u>. This Agreement may not be altered in whole or in part except by a modification, in writing, executed by all the parties to this Agreement.
- 8.3 Entire Agreement. This Agreement, together with all Schedules attached, contains all representations and the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement. Any prior correspondence, memoranda, or agreements, whether or not such correspondence, memoranda, or agreements are in conflict with this Agreement, are intended to be replaced in total by this Agreement and its schedules.
- 8.4 <u>Assignment</u>. Consultant shall not be entitled to assign all or any portion of its rights or obligations contained in this Agreement without obtaining the prior written consent of the District. Nothing in this Agreement shall obligate the District to give such consent. Any purported assignment without the District's consent shall be void.
- 8.5 <u>Binding Effect</u>. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties and their respective purchasers, successors, heirs, and assigns.
- 8.6 <u>Unenforceable Provisions</u>. The terms, conditions, and covenants of this Agreement shall be construed whenever possible as consistent with all applicable laws and regulations. To the extent that any provision of this Agreement, as so interpreted, is held to violate any applicable law or regulation, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless be carried into full force and effect and remain enforceable.

A contract amendment for an additional \$1.2million has been signed.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

- A significant decrease of COVID-19 testing participants has been a concern not only for events
 hosted by the CVEC but for all testing sites county-wide. Aggressive outreach marketing and
 outreach have been conducted leading up to each event that includes, door-to-door outreach,
 radio and television announcements, social media posts, and flyer distribution at food
 distribution sites.
- A new partnership has been established with the Coachella Valley Housing Coalition to schedule COVID-19 testing and vaccine registration through their properties in the Coachell Valley.

COVID-19 Vaccination Update

- As the COVID-19 testing has seen a decline in recent weeks, COVID-19 vaccine events have increased dramatically and the CVEC once again finds itself leading efforts to increase access to underserved communities in the Eastern Coachella Valley, specifically farmworker communities, and now educators and food service workers.
- Since the launch of the first COVID-19 vaccine event at Tudor Ranch, Inc on January 21st., multiple on-site registrations and vaccination events have been held.

Subject: Behavioral Health Initiative Staffing Update

The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation Board and staff welcome Jana Trew, M.A. to its team, as Senior Program Officer – Behavioral Health.

Background:

- On Monday, April 26, 2021, Jana Trew of Desert Hot Springs began duties as a key ambassador for the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation in the desert community. Her duties as Senior Program Officer Behavioral Health will include working in collaboration with the Chief Program Officer, Chief Executive Officer, program staff and grantees to identify collaboration opportunities and implement a collective impact approach to the Coachella Valley Behavioral Health Coalition. She will further advance the District/Foundation's charitable purpose and advance the realization of Board-approved policies.
- The job responsibilities cover community health improvement planning and assessment. These include completing and implementing a Behavioral Health Improvement Plan for the valley with broad community participation.
- Ms. Trew brings to the job more than a decade of professional experience with an emphasis on behavioral health support services in Southern California. Notably, starting in 2008 with Victor Community Support Services, she managed programs and services focused on transitional youth, developed and executed services for children and families with a \$15 million annual budget, and provided oversight of the coordination and delivery of services as a regional director in Los Angeles.
- Her experience also has prepared her for regional leadership, project management, budget development, case management, process improvements, strategic planning and more.
- Ms. Trew earned a Master of Science degree in counseling psychology from California Baptist University. Her professional affiliations include the California Alliance of Children & Family Services and the Association of Community Human Service Agencies Board.

Subject: 2021 Summer Cooling Center Funding

Staff Recommendation: Consideration to approve a NTE amount of \$20,000 to support utility costs at the three summer cooling centers – Palm Springs, Cathedral City and Desert Hot Springs.

Please see attached written request from Greg Rodriguez, Supervisor Perez and CVHEART Homeless Collaborative.

Background:

- Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has been supporting Summer Cooling Centers since 2019.
- In 2020, the Desert Healthcare District provided support for the cost of utilities at the three centers for a total of \$14,419
- The Summer Cooling Centers are daytime and overnight safe shelters that provide relief from the extreme heat during the summer months (June through September).
- The Cooling Centers are also utilized as access points to engage the homeless population for wrap-around services using the Housing First model.
- CVRM operates the Centers, which is a 24-hour operation.

Fiscal Impact: none as funds will be allocated from the Homelessness Initiative Fund

- Total uncommitted funds in the Homelessness Initiative Fund = \$73,214.
- On a separate note, as an FYI, there are \$18,000 remaining in the 2019 established restricted Summer Survival Fund.

Dear DHCD Foundation Board of Directors,

For the past two years Riverside County has worked with local partners to place cooling centers in Palm Springs, Cathedral City and Desert Hot Springs that represent the largest portion of our homeless population in eastern Riverside County. These not only provided relief from the extreme heat, but we utilized them as access points to engage the homeless population for services utilizing the housing first model. The Desert Healthcare District was a major partner in this effort the last two years.

While funding is limited this year, Supervisor Perez' office is working to see about the possibility of replicating these efforts for the summer of 2021 if we can secure the necessary funding. The estimated cost for each site would be \$30,000 per month for a total of \$90,000 per month. If we were able to expand those hours to provide 24-hour services, not only would be preventing people from sleeping in the heat, we could also enhance our delivery of services and access to permanent housing solutions. For a 24-hour operation, the budget would need to be doubled.

As we examine our possibilities, we are once again asking if the District could provide a utility fund allocation not to exceed \$20,000. This assists our organizations that donate their facilities in covering some of the expenses outside of the usual center operating costs.

• At the March 23, 2021 Directors meeting, the District & Foundation Board unanimously approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that provides \$500,000 for the CV Housing First program for the period of April 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

• The MOU states that CVAG and District/Foundation staff will coordinate on healthrelated program metrics that will be tracked within the quarterly reports, providing additional tracking on the work CVAG is doing to connect CV 200 clients to mental and behavioral health programs as well as social services.

• At the April 21, 2021 CVAG Homelessness Committee, the MOU was placed on the agenda for Discussion/Action to authorize the Executive Director to execute the MOU with the Desert Healthcare District/Foundation to accept \$500,000 for the CV Housing First program operations.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Authorize the Executive Director to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with the Desert Healthcare District/ Foundation to accept \$500,000 for the CV Housing First program operations

Background: Recognizing the links between mental health and homelessness, the Desert Healthcare District/ Foundation has been a longstanding supporter of regional homelessness solutions, including CV Housing First. The District/ Foundation funded an independent analysis of the Coachella Valley's programs and services by renowned expert Barbara Poppe & Associates, whose report "The Path Forward" helped shape CVAG's programs.

The District/ Foundation has also been instrumental in funding CVAG's CV Housing First Program. In June 2017, the day after the CVAG Executive Committee approved its first contract with Path of Life to operate CV Housing First, the District/ Foundation Board of Directors met and unanimously agreed to fully fund the West Valley Homelessness Initiative collective fund up to \$2 million. The District's funding program provided a dollar-for-dollar match when cities or tribes contributed more than \$100,000 to the CV Housing First program. This funding has been critical to the program's impact in the community.

In September 2020, the CVAG Homelessness and Executive Committees supported transitioning the CV Housing First program into one that is run in-house by CVAG staff. In October 2020, CVAG sent a letter requesting the District/Foundation continue the funding match program for fiscal year 20/21. CVAG worked with the District/ Foundation staff to craft a request so that it coincides with the focus of CV Housing First in 2021, where staff has worked with local law enforcement and other partners to come up with the CV 200 list of chronically homeless individuals who can be helped off the streets through crisis stabilization units and rapid rehousing programs. Given these clients unique challenges and the District/ Foundation's investment in mental health and public health initiatives, CVAG also noted in its request how CVAG will be working with health agencies to help the chronically homeless through streamlining hospital discharges and respite care.

CVAG provided an update on the program to the District/ Foundation in February and the comments from the Board were overwhelmingly supportive of the program's direction and initial success. In March 2021, the District/ Foundation Board unanimously approved a Memorandum of Understanding that provides \$500,000 for the program for the period of April 1, 2021 through

June 30, 2022. The MOU states that CVAG and District/ Foundation staff will coordinate on health-related program metrics that will be tracked within the quarterly reports, providing additional tracking on the work CVAG is doing to connect CV 200 clients to mental and behavioral health programs as well as social services.

Fiscal Analysis: With this agreement, the District/ Foundation will be providing \$500,000 for the program for the period of April 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. The MOU is slightly different than the previous dollar-for-dollar matching program that the District/ Foundation has previously done. However, it does come with a clause that CVAG needs to demonstrate a continued commitment of current funding levels from the CVAG member agencies.

CVAG has made a request that all member jurisdictions contribute \$100,000 for its 2020/2021 share, and staff is in the process of presenting a program update to every City Council. To date, the Cities of Cathedral City, La Quinta, Palm Desert and Rancho Mirage have confirmed their financial support for this fiscal year.

At the same time, CVAG has been reconciling its outstanding revenues for the Homelessness Fund from fiscal year 2019/2020. While CVAG had widespread support for the program, CVAG has identified five cities that have supported the program but did not send last fiscal year's committed contribution. They are the Cities of Cathedral City, Indio, Palm Desert, Palm Springs and Rancho Mirage. This is reflected on the fund's unaudited revenue and expenditures statement and related fund balance (presented in the agenda packet as an information item).

CVAG is in the process of checking with each City to confirm its records. Because CVAG has traditionally not sent a formal invoice for these contributions, CVAG staff understands that submitting the contributions may have been overlooked or delayed due to the work-from-home conditions experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic. CVAG is in the process of contacting

cities and ensuring last year's \$100,000 contribution is received and, in the future, will issue formal invoices to ensure there is no lag in revenue moving forward.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN COACHELLA VALLEY ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS AND DESERT HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made and entered into this 23rd Day of March, 2021, by and between the Coachella Valley Association of Governments, a California joint powers agency ("CVAG") and the Desert Healthcare Foundation, a California 501(c) (3) public benefit corporation ("Foundation") for the purpose of the Foundation participating in the CV Housing First Program ("CV Housing First Program")

WHEREAS, in 2005, CVAG formed a Homeless Task Force in partnership with Riverside County Supervisor Roy Wilson which resulted in the creation of Roy's Desert Resource Center; and

WHEREAS, the Homeless Task Force evolved into a standing Homelessness Committee ("Homelessness Committee") within the CVAG committee structure, which works with Riverside County and CVAG member cities to combat homelessness through-out the Coachella Valley; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation is a member of the Homelessness Committee; and

WHEREAS, the Homelessness Committee has sponsored housing first programs in recent years that have also received substantial financial support from Riverside County, contributions by CVAG member cities and tribes, and grants from the Desert Healthcare District; and

WHEREAS, on December 31, 2020 CVAG terminated the agreement with Path of Life

Ministries (Path of Life) and brought the CV Housing First programming in-house to provide Rapid

Resolution, Crisis Stabilization Units and wrap-around case management continuing with the

"Housing First" philosophy; and

WHEREAS, in 2017 the Desert Healthcare District ("District"), as part of its three-year strategic plan, challenged communities to partner in combating homelessness by providing matching funding opportunities through a collective fund of the Foundation for the program, then known as the West ValleyHomelessness Initiative, that provided a dollar-for-dollar match to each CVAG member that contributed \$103,000 to the West Valley Housing Navigation Program; and

WHEREAS, in 2021 the Desert Healthcare District ("District"), has expressed its commitment to continue support of CV Housing First programming;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenantsherein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. CVAG Responsibilities

CVAG will operate the CV Housing First program, providing rapid resolution, crisis stabilization housing, and wrap around services in the Coachella Valley within the District boundaries. CV Housing First will primarily focus on the CV 200, a list of chronically homeless individuals across the Coachella Valley who have been identified by local law enforcement and partnering agencies. This program will help address public health goals by addressing high utilizers of emergency room and medical services, assistance with hospital discharge planning and placement and working with partner organizations on increasing respite care services. CVAG will provide periodic quarterly reports and budget progress reports with measurable outcomes to the CVAG Executive Committee and CVAG Homelessness Committee, of which the District is a member.

2. Foundation Contribution

The Foundation will provide \$500,000 for the period of April 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022 for the CV Housing First Program. The Foundation funds will be paid upon satisfactory verification of a continued commitment of current funding levels from the CVAG member agencies. Funds shall only be used for the purposes of combating homelessness through rapid resolution, crisis

stabilization, and wrap-around case management services within the District boundaries. The Foundation intends to contribute in future years, but such contributions will be discretionary and conditioned on successful outcomes.

3. Deliverables

The CV Housing First program is operated by CVAG. The funds will be primarily used to help clients on the CV 200 list, who are chronically homeless individuals across the Coachella Valley who have been identified by local law enforcement and partnering agencies. CVAG and Foundation staff will coordinate on health-related program metrics that will be presented to the Board and tracked within the quarterly reports that are provided to CVAG's committees and the Foundation. These metrics will allow the program to focus on shifting the chronic homeless from the streets and camps into housing and connect with mental/ behavioral health and social services.

4. Restrictions and Reporting

The funds received by CVAG from the Foundation are designated only for the operations of the CV Housing First Program and shall be conditioned on the administration of the program being directed through CVAG staff and overseen by the CVAG Homelessness Committee and CVAG Executive Committee. CVAG will provide the Foundation with quarterly written reports and budget progress reports with measurable outcomes.

5. Cancellation

This MOU may be cancelled with or without cause by either party upon 45-days written notice to the other party.

6. Effective Date

The effective date of this MOU shall be April 1, 2021

7. Term

This MOU shall continue in effect until June 30, 2022 from the effective date or until terminated by either party.

8. Modification

This MOU may not be modified except by written agreement executed by duly authorized representatives of each party.

Thank you for informing us regarding your intent to provide a donation to the parish of *El Santuario de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe*, in Mecca in memory of Fr. Francisco Valdovinos, S.T.

Perhaps many of you were witnesses to the way Fr. Francisco placed his hands and feet into action. His actions revealed what was most at the center of his heart. As members of the same Religious Congregation, the Missionary Servants of the Most Holy Trinity, we shared the same address where we lived and prayed together. There is much that we remember. One memory that was most noticeable, especially in the days leading up to his hospitalization, were the words "temenos que buscar cómo consolar a nuestra gente" – we have to find a way to bring consolation to our people. This was his heart and soul, how to bring consolation to God's people.

A donation, in his memory, to the Church of Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, would be used with deliberate care, in the following areas:

Youth Ministry. Everyone has experienced a sense of loss with the passing of Fr. Francisco, especially the youth. There is a need to create a space for them to feel safe and also find the tools necessary to succeed in school. Many young people do not have access to the internet and much less to a computer. I believe space can be found in the office area where an after-school program could be provided. Funds could be used to provide a small stipend to volunteers and perhaps be able to purchase some computers.

Evangelization through Technology. Fr. Francisco would constantly gravitate towards a microphone and a monitor. He loved singing with the Mariachi, but more than anything, he searched for the possibility of reaching out through digital means. He did so using a cellphone connection and Face Book. One of the last celebrations he had, the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, was broadcast through a local TV station. He wanted to link the celebration to the message of hope that Our Lady of Guadalupe brought. A message that included being proactive in taking care of one's health and the health of the family. In other words, to be tested for Covid-19 and follow the protocols.
