Recommendation:

Consideration to approve the No Cost Time Extension Addendum #3 (June 30, 2022) with CONCUR, Inc. to complete an Emergency Communication Plan related to Prevention, Mitigation, and Emergency Preparedness for Airborne Environmental Hazards in the Eastern Coachella Valley (ECV).

Background:

- At the November 2019 Foundation meeting, the Board approved a \$500,000 allocation from the Robert Avery Family Trust to address Airborne Environmental Hazards that impact pulmonary functions of Eastern Coachella Valley residents, to advance research and rehabilitation solutions for the ECV population.
- The Board directed staff to identify a consultant to facilitate a stakeholder's engagement process to identify strategies to mitigate and prevent the high levels of airborne environmental hazards.
- CONCUR, Inc, is a California-based private consultancy company with significant experience and expertise addressing similar situations across the United States.
- The board approved a 12-month service agreement, NTE \$191,573, with CONCUR, Inc. executed on January 31, 2020.
- Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, progress on the project has been hindered.
- At the June 2021 Board meeting, a no-cost extension was approved through December 31, 2021.
- At the November 9, 2021, Finance & Administration Committee meeting, the Committee approved the request and recommended forwarding to the Board for consideration of approval.
- Staff recommends a third no-cost time extension to June 30,2022, while the project is completed.
- Addendum #3 to the service agreement is attached for your review and consideration.

Fiscal Impact:

- Original service agreement NTE \$191,573 Board approved allocation from the \$1M Avery Trust Funds.

<u>Staff Recommendation</u>: Consideration to hire the Program Assistant for the CV Equity Collaborative

Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation received \$2.4 million from the County of Riverside and \$725,000 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faithbased organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

Information

- To date, the CVEC has hosted more than 150 vaccination clinics and 50 testing events throughout the Coachella Valley.
- As COVID-19 cases continue to increase, there will be a demand for additional COVID-19 testing and vaccine events.
- The looming booster vaccinations and potential school districts mandating staff and students to be vaccinated the CVEC once again finds itself leading efforts to host and organize testing and vaccination events to increase access once again to underserved communities in the Coachella Valley, specifically farmworker communities, and now educators and students.
- With this potential increase in COVID-19 testing and vaccination clinics, additional assistance is required to ensure the CVEC meets the demand.
- The Program Assistant will support the Chief of Community Engagement in the day-to-day administrative and field operations of the COVID-19 response activities led by the CVEC and its community and medical partners.

<u>Update – November 9, 2021</u>

• The job description was approved at the September 14, 2021 F&A Committee meeting.

- The Program Assistant was approved for hire once further funding from the county was secured. To date, the county has not completed the additional funding.
- With the approval of children ages 5-11 now eligible for the Pfizer vaccination, in addition to boosters, the CVEC is in full swing with vaccination events.
- To meet the needs of the increasing schedule of events, the Chief of Community Engagement is in need of immediate support.
- At the November 9, 2021, Finance & Administration Committee meeting, the Committee approved the request and recommended forwarding to the Board for consideration of approval.
- Staff recommends hiring the Program Assistant as soon as possible.

Fiscal Impact:

Cost of the Program Assistant (\$19.23-\$33.65/hour) is expected to be covered by additional funding from Riverside County ELC and Public Health Institute grants.

WHEREAS, Desert Healthcare Foundation ("Foundation") is committed to preserving and fostering access and participation in meetings of its Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e) makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain emergency conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the Foundation's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote vaccines, masking, and social distancing, and that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors previously adopted Resolution No. 21-03 on September 28, 2021, finding that the requisite conditions exist for the Board of Directors of the Foundation to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in Government Code section 54953(e), the Board of Directors must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the Foundation, and the Board of Directors has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the Foundation and vaccine compliance, masking, and social distancing measures are required to be followed for the continued health and safety of the Foundation Board, staff, and the public; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the Foundation shall conduct its meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by Government Code section 54953(e), and that such meetings shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in Government Code section 54953(e);

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Desert Healthcare Foundation Board of Directors as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>: <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

<u>Section 2</u>: <u>Affirmation that a Local Emergency Persists</u>. The Board of Directors hereby considers the conditions of the state of emergency in the Foundation and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the Foundation.

<u>Section 3</u>: <u>Re-Ratification of the Governor's Proclamation of a State of</u> <u>Emergency</u>. The Board hereby ratifies the Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency.

<u>Section 4</u>. <u>Remote Teleconference Meetings</u>. The Foundation's Chief Executive Officer is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this resolution, including conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act.

Subject: CV Equity Collaborative: COVID-19 Testing and Vaccine Update

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> Informational item only

Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation to received \$1.2 million from the County of Riverside and \$500,00 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faithbased organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

COVID-19 Testing Update:

- The CVEC has coordinated multiple COVID-19 testing events that have been hosted throughout the Coachella Valley. The tests include both rapid testing (BiNex Now) and PCR testing (Curative).
- RUHS Department of Public Health provided the CVEC Promotoras training on August 19th at the RAP Foundation conference center on the new testing kits rapid and PCR tests that will capture the Delta variant. A total of 43 Promotoras and staff from partner organizations participated in the training.
- A partnership with CVUSD has established three weekly testing sites for students, staff, and community members. On Monday, October 18th CVUSD launched a free testing campaign at 21 school sites, including the CVUSD District offices. Testing will be made available to CVUSD students and community members free of charge.

- An additional weekly testing site at the TODEC offices in Coachella was launched on Monday, September 20th to increase access to testing. Testing will be hosted every Monday from 10am to 5pm.
- To date, a total of 68 testing clinics resulting in 6,477 COVID-19 tests have been conducted in events organized by the CVEC and the RUHS-Department of Public Health.

COVID-19 Vaccination Update

- As the COVID-19 testing has seen a decline in recent weeks, COVID-19 vaccine events have increased dramatically and the CVEC once again finds itself leading efforts to increase access to underserved communities in the Eastern Coachella Valley, specifically farmworker communities, and now educators and food service workers.
- Since the launch of the first COVID-19 vaccine event at Tudor Ranch, Inc on January 21st., multiple on-site registrations and vaccination events have been held. To date, a total of more than **219** COVID-19 vaccination clinics resulting in **36**,785 COVID-19 vaccines have been provided to District residents in vaccination clinics hosted by the CVEC in partnership with the RUHS-Department of Public Health and Rite Aid pharmacies and Desert Care Network.
- Using RUHS Department of Public Health vaccination data, special emphasis is being placed on the three Coachella Valley cities with the lowest vaccination rates. Those cities include Coachella, Indio, and Desert Hot Springs. A comprehensive community outreach plan has been developed with community partners to ensure those cities are targeted by door-to-door outreach, tabling events, and social media outreach.
- In partnership with CVUSD and DSUSD, the CVEC has hosted three pediatric vaccination clinics for children ages 5-11, where 298 children were vaccinated. An additional 10 vaccination clinics are planned in November and December.
- In partnership with Growing CV, two Pfizer booster vaccine clinics were hosted on November 3rd and 4th at Grimmway Farms in Thermal, where 495 farmworkers were vaccinated. An additional two Pfizer booster vaccination clinics are planned for December 2nd and 3rd at Belk Farms in Thermal.
- In collaboration with College of the Desert (COD) and Borrego Health, COVID-19 vaccination clinics have been scheduled at the main campus in Palm Desert every Tuesday from 9am to 1pm; and every Thursday at the Indio campus from 4pm to 7pm. These clinics are in preparation for the vaccine mandate announced by COD that all students attending inperson classes or services at any campus must be vaccinated before the start of the Spring 2022 semester on January 31st.

Fiscal Impact:

Riverside County Contract: \$2,400,000, of which \$440,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff.

Public Health Institute grant: \$725,000, of which \$90,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff

Updates:

CONCUR: Air Quality Emergency Communication Plan

- On October 14, 2019, an illegal fire in Thermal was reported in the news that severely impacted the eastern Coachella valley for several weeks.
- At the District Board meeting on October 22, 2019. Thermal residents and school officials provided public comment on the impact the illegal mulch fire. As a result, staff was instructed to identify and recommend possible solutions to the problem.
- At the District Board meeting on February 25, 2020, the Board approved a service agreement with CONCUR, Inc, to develop an air quality emergency communication plan, which will include input from local organizations and residents.
- Since the approval of the service agreement, CONCUR, Inc has been successful in connecting with key stakeholders at the federal, state, and local level to gather information on the Thermal fires, tribal land use issues, and current emergency response procedures. Those key stakeholders include:
 - Congressman Raul Ruiz
 - United States Environmental Protection Agency
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs
 - California Air Resources Board
 - California Environmental Protection Agency
 - South Coast Air Quality Management District
 - Riverside County Department of Environmental Health
 - Torres-Martinez Environmental Protection Agency
- CONCUR, Inc finalized a briefing paper with information gathered from various meetings and research. The briefing paper includes:
 - Eastern Coachella Valley environmental justice issues
 - Chronology of the Thermal fires
 - Tribal land use and jurisdiction problems
 - The breakdown in communication and response
 - Initial list of key stakeholder entities and potential representatives

- On June 16, 2021, CONCUR and DHCD met with Congressman Ruiz, tribal members from Torres Martinez and Cabazon Band of Mission Indians, along with representatives from the offices of Supervisors Perez and Assemblyman Garcia to review the briefing paper, and discuss the next steps in the development of the emergency communication plan.
- The next steps will be to convene a series of six collaborative meetings with key stakeholders with the objective of establishing a clear problem statement, improving communication amongst agencies and other collaborative members, identifying proactive steps to reduce risk of toxic waste burning, and developing an agreed upon emergency communication plan.

However, despite not having a medical provider, and in order to keep consistency and presence in the community, Borrego Health's mobile clinic was still present during all the agreed Wednesdays. A Nurse, Medical Assistant and Customer Services Rep. were available to offer limited services such as Immunizations including COVID Vaccine, COVID testing and triage all walk-ins to direct them to medical services as determined appropriate by the nurse depending on patients' needs (clinic or telehealth). During this month, Medical Mobile Services continued to be promoted and marketed thru flyer distribution at local business, churches, during the James O Jessie Open house community event. The electronic flyer was also sent to the Palm Springs Unified School District who then shared it with families who reside and or attend schools in the Palm Springs area. 		Due to the ever-changing situation related to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) and most recently the surge in positive cases due to the Delta Variant, dental professionals continue to be considered of increased occupational risk because of their routine exposure to patient's airways and performance of aerosol-generating procedure.
