RESOLUTION NO. 21-09

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF DESERT HEALTHCARE DISTRICT RE-RATIFYING THE STATE OF EMERGENCY AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERNCE MEETINGS

WHEREAS, Desert Healthcare Foundation ("Foundation") is committed to preserving and fostering access and participation in meetings of its Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e) makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain emergency conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the Foundation's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote vaccines, masking, and social distancing, and that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors previously adopted Resolution No. 21-03 on September 28, 2021, finding that the requisite conditions exist for the Board of Directors of the Foundation to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in Government Code section 54953(e), the Board of Directors must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the Foundation, and the Board of Directors has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the Foundation and vaccine compliance, masking, and social distancing measures are required to be followed for the continued health and safety of the Foundation Board, staff, and the public; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the Foundation shall conduct its meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by Government Code section 54953(e), and that such meetings shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in Government Code section 54953(e);

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Desert Healthcare Foundation Board of Directors as follows:

- <u>Section 1</u>: <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- <u>Section 2</u>: <u>Affirmation that a Local Emergency Persists</u>. The Board of Directors hereby considers the conditions of the state of emergency in the Foundation and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the Foundation.
- <u>Section 3</u>: <u>Re-Ratification of the Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency.</u> The Board hereby ratifies the Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency.
- Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Foundation's Chief Executive Officer is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this resolution, including conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act.

Subject: CV Equity Collaborative: COVID-19 Testing and Vaccine Update

Staff Recommendation: Informational item only

Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation to received \$1.2 million from the County of Riverside and \$500,00 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

COVID-19 Testing Update:

- The CVEC has coordinated multiple COVID-19 testing events that have been hosted throughout the Coachella Valley. The tests include both rapid testing (BiNex Now) and PCR testing (Curative).
- RUHS Department of Public Health provided the CVEC Promotoras training on August 19th at the RAP Foundation conference center on the new testing kits rapid and PCR tests that will capture the Delta variant. A total of 43 Promotoras and staff from partner organizations participated in the training.
- A partnership with CVUSD has established three weekly testing sites for students, staff, and community members. On Monday, October 18th CVUSD launched a free testing campaign at 21 school sites, including the CVUSD District offices. Testing will be made available to CVUSD students and community members free of charge.

- An additional weekly testing site at the TODEC offices in Coachella was launched on Monday, September 20th to increase access to testing. Testing will be hosted every Monday from 10am to 5pm.
- To date, a total of 75 testing clinics resulting in 6,821 COVID-19 tests have been conducted in events organized by the CVEC and the RUHS-Department of Public Health.

COVID-19 Vaccination Update

- Since the launch of the first COVID-19 vaccine event at Tudor Ranch, Inc on January 21st., multiple on-site registrations and vaccination events have been held. To date, a total of more than 227 COVID-19 vaccination clinics resulting in 37,874 COVID-19 vaccines have been provided to District residents in vaccination clinics hosted by the CVEC in partnership with the RUHS-Department of Public Health and Rite Aid pharmacies and Borrego Health.
- Using RUHS Department of Public Health vaccination data, special emphasis is being placed on the three Coachella Valley cities with the lowest vaccination rates. Those cities include Coachella, Indio, and Desert Hot Springs. A comprehensive community outreach plan has been developed with community partners to ensure those cities are targeted by door-to-door outreach, tabling events, and social media outreach.
- In partnership with CVUSD and DSUSD, the CVEC has hosted 8 pediatric vaccination clinics for children ages 5-11, where 815 children were vaccinated. An additional 3 vaccination clinics are planned in December.
- At all new pediatric vaccination clinics hosted by the CVEC, all vaccinated children receive a "goodie" bag with an educational activity booklet developed by El Sol NEC, hand sanitizer holders, children surgical masks with fun designs, and a superhero mask.
- In partnership with Growing CV, **two** Pfizer booster vaccine clinics were hosted on November 3rd and 4th at Grimmway Farms in Thermal, where **495** farmworkers were vaccinated. An additional **two** Pfizer booster vaccination clinics were held on December 2nd and 3rd at Belk Farms in Thermal, where a total of 474 farmworkers were vaccinated.
- In collaboration with College of the Desert (COD) and Borrego Health, COVID-19 vaccination clinics have been scheduled at the main campus in Palm Desert every Tuesday from 9am to 1pm; and every Thursday at the Indio campus from 4pm to 7pm. These clinics are in preparation for the vaccine mandate announced by COD that all students attending inperson classes or services at any campus must be vaccinated before the start of the Spring 2022 semester on January 31st.

<u>Fiscal Impact:</u> Riverside County Contract: \$2,400,000, of which \$440,000 will support/compensate DHCF

Public Health Institute grant: \$725,000, of which \$90,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff

Subject: Medical Mobile Unit Acquisition Update

Staff Recommendation: Informational item only

<u>Background:</u> The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative efforts to mitigate the impact of the current COVID-19 epidemic have increased the participation of underserved community residents in COVID-19 testing and vaccinations. By addressing and reducing barriers to access like transportation and increasing the proximity of health and wellness programs and/or services to where community residents live, work, and pray have demonstrated a need to continue this strategy and service delivery model.

On May 25, 2021, the DHCD Board of Directors approved \$336,500 for the acquisition of a medical mobile unit. The addition of a mobile unit to the DHCD would increase the District's visibility throughout the Coachella Valley. Thus, continuing to build upon the remarkable progress accomplished by the CVEC by collaborating with community partners to address health equity problems by reducing access barriers like transportation, the days and hours of the provision of services, and proximity of services and programming.

Update:

Staff solicited quotes from multiple manufacturers and selected the quote from Magnum Mobile Specialty Vehicles of \$170,000 for a 26ft. medical mobile unit, that includes two examinations rooms, along with a full restroom. The remaining approved funds will be utilized for ongoing operational and maintenance costs. The project delivery date is slated for May 2022.

Fiscal Impact:

\$336,500 of which \$175,000 will come from The Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District (CVRCD) grant.

Donna Craig, Chief Program
Officer, described the black and
African American healthcare
scholars' advisory committee

strategy to include young men of
color in the program is outreach
to the Palm Springs High School
sports medicine career pathway.

Ms. Craig explained the most recent Borrego Health Wellness Committee meeting describing an increase in vaccinations and boosters, preventive health, education on telehealth, following up with the uninsured, and testing versus vaccination-related patient visits. A new Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) funded mobile unit will be available for service at the end of the year



with the Desert Highland Gateway Estates community as one of the first communities to utilize the new unit.

The University of California Riverside (UCR) recommended a newly graduated individual in the Coachella Valley with Borrego Health extending a fulltime offer of employment for the open Community Health Worker position

Subject: Coachella Valley – Wide School Districts Gun Violence Prevention Efforts in Partnership with Riverside County office of Education (Strategic Plan Linkage: Goal #3: Proactively Expand Community Access to Behavioral and Mental Health Services).

Staff Recommendation: Information only

History/Background:

- According to the CDC, there are over 38,000 gun deaths every year in the United States, including more than 20,000 suicides, many of which are children—every parent's nightmare. School shootings have become too frequent, and parents and school administrators are often inadequately equipped to deal with the mental illness at the root of these events.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation is well positioned to partner with local school
 districts and explore how best to address this epidemic. Staff has reached out to Riverside
 County Office of Education and to the three local school districts' superintendents and is
 planning a joint meeting to explore potential actions to improve access to behavioral health
 resources in their districts.
- This convening will provide the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation with an
 opportunity to support prevention efforts as the existing programs, resources and needs are
 identified.
- These efforts are intended to result in the coordination and information sharing necessary to
 ensure the safety of our students and staff as they focus on their academic pursuits and wellbeing.

Subject: Regional Access Project Foundation – January 2022 Mental Health Initiative

A Collective/Collaborative Opportunity. Strategic Plan Linkage: Goal #3: Proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental health services

Staff Recommendation: Consideration to approve a contribution of a \$300,000 match to the Regional Access Project Foundation (RAP) in partnership with the organization's Request for Proposal (RFP) January 2022 Mental Health Initiative. This continued partnership offers, again, an opportunity to leverage additional funding and to promote a collective impact approach to addressing the behavioral health needs of Coachella Valley residents.

History/Background:

- In January 2021 RAP Foundation released a Request for Proposal (RFP) Mental Health Initiative 2021.1. for *Supporting Existing Programs Struggling due to COVID-19*.
- The total grant award allocation was \$150,000 and addressed one or more of six (6) funding goals substance use; depression; anxiety/stress; homelessness; suicide ideation/self-harm behaviors; and/or isolation/grief/loss.
- In February the District board of Directors approved a contribution of \$150,000 to match RAP's \$150,000 that in partnership brought the total funds that was awarded to \$300,000.
- Fourteen (14) organizations were awarded on April 28, 2021. DHCD will receive a final report at the end of the RFP term.

January 2022 Mental Health Initiative:

- The Regional Access Project Foundation's Mental Health Initiative Committee (of which CPO Donna Craig represents the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation as a member) reviewed the upcoming RFP for the January 2022 Mental Health Initiative.
- The RAP Board of Directors approved the RFP at their December 8, 2021 meeting. (Please see RFP attached for reference)
- The approved amount to be awarded is \$300,000.
- This 2022 Mental Health Initiative entails results-driven approaches and practices, following the guidelines of Results Based Accountability (RBA) with the goal that all east Riverside County residents are mentally and emotionally healthy.
- A target population has been determined primarily low-income east Riverside County residents with emphasis on BIPOC (Black and Indigenous People of Color) family units with children.
- Strategies with Performance Measures have been identified of which potential grantee organizations must show an alignment with.

DHCF consideration:

- In October 2021 the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation Board of Directors approved their 5-year Strategic Plan.
- Of the seven (7) goals that were approved, **Goal #3:** *Proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental health services* aligns with the goals and strategies of RAP's Mental Health Initiative RFP for programs intended to meet, improve, and increase access to mental health services and resources for eastern Riverside County residents.
- District staff and RAP staff met and reviewed the performance measures of each organization, with many similarities for measuring potential impact of grant funding.
- As the District moves forward with its own strategies and performance measures for **strategic plan goal 3** (*proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental services*), the evaluation of RAP's Mental Health Initiative and results of the funding impact will in turn allow the District to measure impact and outcomes in alignment with this important collaborative partnership in reducing disparities in the Coachella Valley's mental health crisis.

Fiscal Impact:

\$300,000 to be allocated from the budget of the board-approved Behavioral Health Initiative Collective Fund.

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SECTION I: ABOUT REGIONAL ACCESS PROJECT FOUNDATION

The Regional Access Project Foundation (RAP) Inc. was incorporated in 1992 as a 501(c)(3) public benefit corporation in order to address unmet needs in health, mental health and juvenile intervention for residents of eastern Riverside County through grants and technical assistance to not-for-profit service providers.

Funding of the RAP Foundation is primarily through unique cooperative agreements between the RAP Foundation and the County of Riverside; and, between the County of Riverside and the City of Palm Desert Redevelopment Agency.

Our mission:

Providing funding, oversight, technical assistance and guidance to non-profit community-based organizations, or collaborative groups, and other tax-exempt agencies which serve the populations of eastern Riverside County in the areas of health, mental health and juvenile interventions.

Our Vision:

To enhance the quality of life for all residents of eastern Riverside County by investing in nonprofits and empowering them to effectively serve unmet needs identified by the RAP Foundation Board of Directors.

SECTION III: TYPE OF GRANT

There is only <u>one type</u> of grant award available for this initiative. There is a total of \$300,000 available in grant allocation funding for the Mental Health Initiative.

Mental Health Initiative grant:

The Mental Health Initiative (MHI) grant is for programs intended to meet, improve, and increase access to mental health services and resources for eastern Riverside County residents. Funded programs should have the intention to create a lasting impact on the residents served by the program and help to foster long term change for residents in need of mental health services.

Organizations who request mental health funding must serve the identified target population (see Strategy Map - Exhibit A) and align with at least <u>one</u> Result and Strategy area identified in the RAP Foundation Strategy Map. Grantees must be able (and will be required) to produce and report on required, corresponding performance measures.

- Organizations are invited to submit no more than ONE proposal for the Mental Health Initiative grant.
- Grant period is for **one year**.
- This is a competitive grant program. Not all qualifying applications will be funded.
- The Application is an on-line process and requires an active account with the RAP Foundation's *Foundant* tool in order to access the application process and information.
- Organizations applying for MHI funding must be able to provide outcome data on the RAP
 Foundation identified performance measures, demographic data and anecdotal success stories as
 well as submit a mid-year and year-end report to include this data and budget expenditures
 supporting the program.
- MHI Grants can be used for any of the program costs (e.g. staff time, supplies, facility, etc.) but not on general operating costs.
- The amount of each MHI grant award is dependent on the strength of the proposal and the capacity to serve.

SECTION IV: MENTAL HEALTH PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES

Organizations applying for RAP Foundation funding are required to identify the Result Area(s) and Strategy(s) their request supports for the Mental Health Initiative. The Mental Health Strategy Map is attached as Exhibit A.

SECTION V: ELIGIBILITY TO APPLY

To be eligible to apply for a 2022 RAP Foundation Grant, an applicant must:

- Be a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization for a minimum of 1 year.
- Provide direct services within the scope of the Mental Health Initiative priorities to improve the mental and emotional health of residents within the defined geographic region of service for the RAP Foundation (Eastern Riverside County).
- Attend a mandatory orientation meeting.

SECTION VI: APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

Applications for grants are reviewed in a 4 stage process:

Stage 1 – Letters of Intent

Letters of Intent (LOI) must be submitted online **by January 21, 2022 at 5:00 pm**. LATE LOIS OR LOIS MISSING <u>ANY</u> REQUIRED ATTACHMENTS <u>WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED.</u> In your proposal, submit one Letter of Intent electronic submission through our online portal, along with all required documentation. RAP Foundation staff will screen all LOIs for eligibility and completeness. Applicants who successfully submitted an LOI will be notified by **February 4, 2022** if they will advance to Stage 2.

Stage 2 - Full Applications

The selected organizations who advanced to this stage are to submit a full application through our online portal before **February 18, 2022 at 5:00 pm**. Again, the RAP Foundation staff will screen all applications for eligibility and completeness before forwarding on to our Community Readers for review and scoring (see below section "Required Attachments for the Full Application").

- Scoring preference will be given to applications where the identified priority target population is being served by the Applicant's program.
- Scoring preference will be given to applications where collaboration with other organizations is identified to meet the desired outcomes/results for clients.
- Scoring preference will be given to Applicants who serve the Blythe area.
- Organizations may be required to undergo a site visit; The RAP Foundation reserves the right to conduct a site visit to all funded agencies throughout the current funding cycle.
- Applications will be reviewed and scored by the Readers by March 9, 2022
- Those whose scores by the Readers are not high enough will be notified by **March 11**, **2022** and will be given the opportunity to re-submit their application, taking into

consideration the Readers' comments. Those Applicants that score high enough will be forwarded to the next stage.

Stage 3 – Grants Committee Review Process:

Those Applicants that score high enough will be <u>required</u> to present their program overview and interview with the Grants Review Committee on **March 14, 2022.**

Stage 4 - Board Approval

Applications that are approved by the Grants Review Committee will be considered for final approval at the **March 23, 2022** full RAP Foundation Board of Directors meeting. Award notifications will be sent out by March 25, 2022.

Subject: California Hospital Association (CHA) – Behavioral Health Care Virtual Symposium December 6 & 7, 2021: Forward Motion: Moving a Crisis Into Action.

Attended by DHCDF Board Director, Carole Rogers, and Senior Program Officer-BH, Jana Trew

Staff Recommendation: Information only

History/Background:

- An estimated 7.5 million people in California experience a mental health disorder in any given year, but only one-third of adults who experience mental illness are getting treatment. The caregivers at hospitals know the obstacles people with behavioral health conditions face and the challenges in getting them the treatment they need.
- The Symposium this year focused heavily on the necessary solutions needed in response to this current situation which has been heightened due to the pandemic.
- Solutions explored included improving access to services, additional funding directed at infrastructure development of facilities, and children's behavioral health system improvements (through innovative practices and service coordination).
- Development of a reengineered crisis response system that supports the needs of those experiencing mental health emergencies was presented by Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health in preparation for the State mandated rollout of the 988 crisis line protocols by July of 2021.
- Juvenile justice improvement presentations included a focus on streamlined transition plans to ensure proper support when returning to their communities' post incarceration. There was additional focus placed on the proper assessment of both juveniles and adults deemed incompetent to stand trial who are still incarcerated.
- Orange County (Be Well Orange County) presented their campus treatment model which uses a singular location to provide both adult and youth mental health and substance use services and has the capacity for both inpatient and community based services.
- Many of the areas of focus presented during the symposium align with the Desert Healthcare
 District and Foundation's Behavioral Health Initiative as our working groups continue to
 work on the development of strategies that will be forwarded to our Steering Committee for
 consideration in their meeting in February.
