#### **Recommendation:**

Consideration to approve the No Cost Time Extension Addendum #4 (June 30, 2023) with CONCUR, Inc. to complete an Emergency Communication Plan related to Prevention, Mitigation, and Emergency Preparedness for Airborne Environmental Hazards in the Eastern Coachella Valley (ECV).

#### **Background:**

- At November 2019 Foundation meeting, the Board approved a \$500,000 allocation from the Robert Avery Family Trust to address Airborne Environmental Hazards that impact pulmonary functions of Eastern Coachella Valley residents, to advance research and rehabilitation solutions for the ECV population.
- The Board directed staff to identify a consultant to facilitate a stakeholder's engagement process to identify strategies to mitigate and prevent the high levels of airborne environmental hazards.
- CONCUR, Inc, is a California-based private consultancy company with significant experience and expertise addressing similar situations across the United States.
- The board approved a 12-month service agreement, NTE \$191,573, with CONCUR, Inc. executed on January 31, 2020.
- Work continues on the project.
- Staff recommends a third no-cost time extension to June 30,2023, while the project is completed.
- At the June 14, 2022, Finance & Administration Committee meeting, the Committee recommended forwarding the Addendum for consideration of approval by the full Board.
- Addendum #4 to the service agreement is attached for your review and consideration.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

- No cost time extension.
- Original service agreement NTE \$191,573 Board approved allocation from the \$1M Avery Trust Funds.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 22-16**

#### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF DESERT HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION RE-RATIFYING THE STATE OF EMERGENCY AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERNCE MEETINGS

WHEREAS, Desert Healthcare Foundation ("Foundation") is committed to preserving and fostering access and participation in meetings of its Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 54953(e) makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain emergency conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the Foundation's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote vaccines, masking, and social distancing, and that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors previously adopted Resolution No. 21-03 on September 28, 2021, finding that the requisite conditions exist for the Board of Directors of the Foundation to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in Government Code section 54953(e), the Board of Directors must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the Foundation, and the Board of Directors has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the Foundation and vaccine compliance, masking, and social distancing measures are required to be followed for the continued health and safety of the Foundation Board, staff, and the public; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the Foundation shall conduct its meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by Government Code section 54953(e), and that such meetings shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in Government Code section 54953(e);

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Desert Healthcare Foundation Board of Directors as follows:

- <u>Section 1</u>: <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- <u>Section 2</u>: <u>Affirmation that a Local Emergency Persists</u>. The Board of Directors hereby considers the conditions of the state of emergency in the Foundation and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the Foundation.
- <u>Section 3</u>: <u>Re-Ratification of the Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The Board hereby ratifies the Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency.
- <u>Section 4.</u> Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Foundation's Chief Executive Officer is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this resolution, including conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> Consideration to approve Resolution 22-17 – Carrying Over Uncommitted Grant Funds from Fiscal Year 2021/2022 For Use In Fiscal Year 2022/2023 - \$1,544,156.

#### **Background:**

- During the fiscal year 2022, the District and Foundation continued to take significant actions directed at COVID-19 education, testing and vaccinations predominantly funded through CARES/Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity (ELC) Enhancing Detection funding through the California Department of Public Health totaling \$3,150,000. Additional funding provided by the Public Health Institute in the amount of \$725,000.
- In June 2021, the Board of Directors approved a resolution to carryover unawarded grant funds to FY21-22.
- As of June 2022, Desert Healthcare Foundation maintains an unawarded grant funding balance of \$1,544,156.
- Resolution 22-17 requests the Board to consider committing the unawarded grant funding to FY23.
- The resolution directs staff to create a reserve (Reserve) for the uncommitted funds on the District's books in the amount of \$1,544,156. The resolution allows the Reserve to be utilized, in addition to the FY23 grant funding budget in FY23. The Reserve will be committed to specific purposes identified and approved by the Directors through the normal grant funding process. The District's audit firm has validated this is an acceptable practice.
- Staff recommends approval of Resolution 22-17.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

\$1,014,156 is a carryover from FY21. \$530,000 will be accrued (Reserve) as an expense and a grant liability on the District's Grants Payments Schedule as of June 30, 2022.

The Reserve will be utilized first in allocating grant funding in FY23 before using the FY23 grant budget.

Subject: CV Equity Collaborative: COVID-19 Testing and Vaccine Update

**Staff Recommendation:** Informational item only

#### **Background:**

• The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation to received \$1.2 million from the County of Riverside and \$500,000 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.

• The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community-and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

#### **COVID-19 Testing Update:**

- The CVEC has coordinated multiple COVID-19 testing events that have been hosted throughout the Coachella Valley. The tests include both rapid testing (BiNex Now) and PCR testing (Curative and Primary Health).
- Promotoras from the Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative received training from the
  Desert Sands Unified School District (DSUSD) staff on the Primary Care PCR testing
  registration site, along with the BinaxNow reporting system (for the summertime only rapid
  testing is available). The CVEC Promotoras have now assumed responsibility of the weekly
  COVID-19 testing for DSUSD at the district office every Tuesday and Thursday from
  3:30pm to 5:30pm.
- A weekly COVID-19 clinic has been established with Torres Martinez Desert Cahuilla
  Indians to increase access to COVID-19 testing in the East Coachella Valley. This is the
  second fixed location established the CVEC partners. The other location is the TODEC office
  in Coachella.
- To date, a total of **164** COVID-19 testing clinics resulting in more than **13,300** COVID-19 tests have been provided at events organized by the CVEC and its partners.
- The CVEC received 2,500 COVID-19 home tests that will be distributed by Promotoras at community-based outreach events and at CVEC testing events. To date, 800 COVID-19 at-home tests have been provided at COVID-19 testing and community events.

- In partnership with California Farmworkers Foundation and Growing Coachella Valley, the CVEC had initiated a 6-week campaign to test 1000 farmworkers. Through a grant CFF was able to secure 1000 gift cards valued at \$20 each to incentivize growers, contractors, and farmworkers to get tested. On a weekly basis CFF and the CVEC are testing approximately 150 participants Monday through Friday at different farms and packing houses throughout the Eastern Coachella Valley.
- The CVEC has released instructional videos in English, Spanish and Purepecha on how to
  preform rapid antigen at home tests. The videos have been uploaded to the DHCD social media
  platforms.

#### **COVID-19 Vaccination Update**

- A partnership between the CVEC and the Coachella Valley Unified School District
  (CVUSD) has launched a COVID-19 vaccination campaign to vaccinate students during
  school hours with written parental consent and without the need for the parent or legal
  guarding to be present. Through these events approximately a total of 1,137 COVID-19
  doses have been provided to students, faculty, and community members.
- To date, a total of more than 324 COVID-19 vaccination clinics resulting in 45,456 COVID-19 vaccines have been provided to District residents in vaccination clinics hosted by the CVEC in partnership with the RUHS-Department of Public Health and Rite-Aid pharmacies and Borrego Health.
- In the last couple of weeks, COVID-19 testing, and vaccination events have seen a decline of participants throughout the county and here in the Coachella Valley. A change in strategy will be implemented to reduce the number of vaccination and testing clinics and increase the community-based outreach that includes, door-to-door outreach and informational tables to selectively target community members.
- Another change in strategy will include a phone banking session with Promotoras to contact community members, who received their 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> dose at one of the CVEC vaccination clinics but haven't received their booster shot. Promotoras will explain the importance of receiving the booster and attempt to register them for an upcoming vaccination clinic or inform them of the nearest vaccination clinic near their home or job.
- The CVEC is working to establish a monthly vaccination site at the CVUSD offices in Thermal. These efforts are due to begin in July.
- In partnership with Borrego Health and DSUDS the CVEC will conduct 3 Immunization clinics for over 1,000 students that are out of compliance with their required vaccines including COVID-19. Clinics are scheduled in July.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

Riverside County Contract: \$2,400,000, of which \$440,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff.

Public Health Institute grant: \$725,000, of which \$90,000 will support/compensate DHCF staff

Subject: Medical Mobile Unit - update

**Staff Recommendation:** Informational item only

#### **Background:**

- On May 25, 2021, the DHCD Board of Directors approved \$336,500 for the acquisition of a medical mobile unit. Of that total amount, \$175,000 came from the Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District grant. The addition of a mobile unit to the DHCD will increase the District's visibility throughout the Coachella Valley.
- A purchase contract for \$170,000 was executed with Magnum Mobile Specialty Vehicles for a 26ft. medical mobile unit, which includes two examinations rooms, along with a full restroom. The remaining approved funds will be utilized for ongoing operational and maintenance costs. The project delivery date has been delayed to September/October 2022 due to the continued pandemic's impact on supply and demand of raw materials and finished goods.
- A Request for Proposals (RFP) seeking an operator of the mobile medical unit was issued in March 2022 with a deadline submission of April 1. 2022.
- DPMG (Desert Physician's Medical Group), which is a 501(c)3 organization of DRMC's Family Medicine Residency Program, applied and ultimately was selected to be the operator of the vehicle and provide healthcare services to underserved communities and its residents.

#### **Update:**

- An MOU was placed on the June 22, 2022 CV Resource Conservation District Board
  agenda for "Consideration to approve a Memorandum of Understanding By and Between
  Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District and Desert Healthcare to the
  Underserved Population in the Coachella Valley with emphasis on Agricultural
  Workers".
- After an anticipated approval of the MOU, it is expected that CVRCD will issue the \$175,000 to the Desert Healthcare District.
- Staff is completing its due diligence to establish an agreement with DPMG Health to manage and operate the Mobile Clinic for a proposed period of time of 3 years.

Fiscal Impact: NTE \$500,000 over 3 years

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING By and Between

Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District and Desert Healthcare District Regarding Medical Mobile Unit to Provide Healthcare to the Underserved Population in the Coachella Valley with emphasis on Agricultural Workers

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made and effective as of <u>June 23</u>, 2022, between the Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District ("CVRCD") and the Desert Healthcare District ("District") (together, the "Parties") for the purchase, retrofit, and operation of a mobile medical unit to provide healthcare to the underserved population in the Coachella Valley with emphasis on agricultural workers.

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, CVRCD is a public agency of the State of California, authorized to acquire and manage open space and park lands, in addition to taking other actions related to conservation purposes in open areas, agricultural areas, urban areas, wildlife areas, and residential areas, under the California Public Resources Code, Division 9; and

WHEREAS, District is a local government agency of the State of California that supports community-based health care services to area residents; and

WHEREAS, the CVRCD Board of Directors, pursuant to Public Resources Code section 9408, may cooperate with other public districts in furtherance of Division 9 to use funds available to CVRCD to address issues of local concern; and

WHEREAS, the unprecedented impact and disruption of COVID-19 has been determined to be of crucial importance to the health of the underserved population in the Coachella Valley and in particular the health of farmworkers; and

WHEREAS, the health of the underserved population and farmworkers is imperative to support food safety; and

WHEREAS, the conservation of agricultural lands is fundamental for food security and production; and

WHEREAS, District has worked to provide the underserved population in the Coachella Valley and farmworkers access to COVID-19 testing and vaccines; and

WHEREAS, CVRCD desires to utilize investment funds to assist the Desert Healthcare District in the amount of \$175,000 for the purchase and retrofit of a mobile unit to provide healthcare to the underserved population in the Coachella Valley with emphasis on agricultural workers in response to the COVID-19 and future health demands within CVRCD and District boundaries.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

EFFECTIVE DATE: This MOU is effective as of this 23rd of June 2022, having been executed by all Parties.

#### 2. DESERT HEALTHCARE DISTRICT SHALL:

- a. Purchase and retrofit a mobile unit.
- b. Use the mobile unit to provide healthcare to the underserved population in the Coachella Valley with emphasis on agricultural workers within CVRCD and District boundaries.
- c. Include the CVRCD's logo/name on a visible surface of the medical mobile unit.

#### CVRCD SHALL:

a. Provide investment funds to assist the District in the amount of \$175,000 for the above-listed purpose.

#### 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS:

- A. <u>COOPERATION:</u> The Parties agree to cooperatively work together to accomplish the goals of this MOU.
- B. <u>MUTUAL COMMITMENT</u>: It is understood that CVRCD's commitments as set forth in this MOU are contingent on District's continued fulfillment of all its respective commitments contained herein. Likewise, District's commitments are contingent on CVRCD's continued fulfillment of all its respective commitments contained herein.

If one Party believes that the other Party may fail or has failed to fulfill all its commitments contained herein, the Parties shall promptly meet in an effort to resolve the alleged failure such that both Parties agree to continue to fulfill all of their commitments contained herein.

- C. <u>COMPLETE AGREEMENT:</u> Subject to the terms of any other written agreements involving the Parties hereto, this MOU contains the complete agreement of CVRCD and District in regards to the subject matter of this MOU, and there are no other agreements, oral or written, except as are included within the terms of this MOU. Any amendments or clarifications to this MOU must be in writing executed by all Parties.
- D. <u>SEVERABILITY:</u> Should any provision of this MOU be found to be void or unenforceable, it shall be severable from the rest of this MOU and the remaining terms shall be enforced as if the unenforceable term had not existed.
- E. <u>MUTUAL DRAFTING:</u> This MOU shall be deemed to have been drafted by both Parties, with each having equal say and status. In no event shall any term be interpreted more favorable as to one Party over another.
- F. <u>TERM:</u> Either Party may withdraw from this MOU upon thirty days' written notice to the other Party. Otherwise, this MOU shall remain in effect until terminated by the mutual written consent of the Parties.
- G. <u>LIMITATIONS:</u> Except as specified in the MOU, nothing in this MOU shall be construed as giving CVRCD or District the right or ability to bind the other or create any joint liability as regards the activities under this MOU. Nothing herein shall be construed as obligating the Parties to expend or be involved in any contract or other obligation for the future payment of money in excess of the appropriations authorized by law and administratively allocated for the above-described actions.

- H. <u>RECITALS AND EXHIBITS:</u> The above recitals are incorporated herein by this reference.
- I. <u>THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES:</u> Nothing in this MOU shall be construed to confer any rights upon any party not a signatory to this MOU.
- J. <u>PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES:</u> Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this MOU, neither Party waives any of the privileges and immunities from liability, exemptions from laws, ordinances and rules, or any pension, relief, disability, worker's compensation and/or any other benefits which apply to the activity of officers, agents or employees of any other Party.
- K. <u>INDEMNITY</u>: Each Party shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless the other Party and its respective members, directors, officers, agents, and employees (each an "<u>Indemnified Party</u>"), from and against any and all claims, demands, damages, liabilities, losses, costs (including attorneys' fees) and expenses (collectively, "<u>Claims</u>") arising out of, connected with, or incidental to this Agreement, except that a Party shall have no obligation to indemnify or hold harmless an Indemnified Party for Claims caused by the negligent or wrongful act of that Indemnified Party.

Subject: Behavioral Health Initiative Expansion

In the most recent Board of Directors meeting on May 24, 2022, the Desert Healthcare District staff was directed to explore an additional allocation of \$2 million for behavioral health and homelessness.

#### **Staff recommendation:**

After careful consideration of community input provided through our Mental and Behavioral Health Needs Assessment (2019), Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) (2020), community stakeholder outreach, and ongoing input from our Behavioral Health Initiative Working Groups and Steering Committee membership (2022), staff recommends the full allocation to be made toward Strategic Goal #3 (Proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental health services) to advance strategic plan priorities identified in this area. This allocation would support the ability to make the necessary resources available through RFP's to better address prevailing needs as expressed by our community members.

The staff is requesting the approval of an additional allocation of \$2 million to the Board-approved Behavioral Health Initiative, bringing the total amount in the collective fund to \$3.3 million.

#### **Background:**

• Behavioral Health Initiative: In response to the results of the DHCD Mental and Behavioral Health Needs Assessment (2019), a stakeholder focused, collaborative model was implemented to begin to review the areas of need as identified by the community members and stakeholder participants in the assessment process. This model which utilizes a Collective Impact framework, consists of regularly scheduled convenings in which strategy and solution development is drafted and presented to the Steering Committee membership for review and input. The primary areas of focus for this initiative work include:

#### Improved Access

Consideration of structural improvements to ensure services reach vulnerable or underserved community members through the inclusion of expanded mobile service access, increased telehealth capacity and expanded provider network opportunities as a means of expanding access. Strategy development includes increasing awareness of available support services with the goal of removing barriers to access which include stigma reduction and the need to communicate in a culturally competent manner with our community members through a network of trusted messengers.

#### o <u>Workforce Development</u>

Strategy development is focused on the ability to increase opportunities for new practitioners entering the field and choosing to stay and work in the Coachella Valley. Improvement to workplace retention processes, professional development pathways for this community, while improving the ability for in-process future practitioners who are still in school or recently graduated to gain the necessary practical experience with organizations in the Coachella Valley which will also assist with improving workforce levels.

#### o Policy Development Opportunities

Development in this area is focused on current and potential legislation under consideration or enacted related to innovating behavioral health services and how they are experienced by consumers. This includes State level intentional focus on children's mental health, juvenile justice support and the overhaul of Medi-Cal and how it can be improved to make coverage more accessible. There is also an effort to ensure Peer Specialist/Community Health Worker roles are clarified and billable and the State mandate to restructure the 911 call system into the 988 call center network in an effort to make mental health suicide prevention and mental health crisis networks more responsive. This working group is closely monitoring this legislative session and identifies legislation that would benefit the areas of need identified in the DHCD Mental and Behavioral Health Needs Assessment and requests organization letters of support as needed to assist with passage.

#### o Community Stakeholder Outreach

The information gained through our ongoing outreach to our law enforcement and education partners and participation in State and County convenings focused on improving community members mental health service experiences while expanding the available workforce are helpful and will inform the identification of potential RFP development opportunities.

#### • Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)

In 2020, the DHCD commissioned the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) in an effort to better understand the needs of residents as it relates to the social determinants of health, uplift inequities and aid in the development of a comprehensive, and cross-sector approach to advance the health and well-being of District residents. This information assisted with the identification of Strategic Goal #2 (Proactively expand community access to primary and specialty care services) as a high priority area of focus for support implementation.

#### • <u>Strategic Plan Goal #3: Proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental</u> health services

Strategies identified as High Priority:

- o 3.1 Provide funding to support an increase in the number of behavioral/mental health professionals (includes training)
- o 3.2 Provide funding to CBOs to support an increase in the number of days and hours of operation of behavioral /mental health services
- 3.3 Provide funding to CBOs enabling an increase in the number and geographic dispersion of sites providing behavioral/mental health services (consider co-location with other health services)
- 3.4 Provide funding support to CBOs providing tele-behavioral/mental health services
- <u>Fiscal impact</u>: \$2,000,000 to be added to the Behavioral Health Initiative allocation in the form of a grant amendment #965 (cost extension) from the District to the Foundation.
- At the June 14, 2022 Strategic Planning Committee Meeting and Program Committee Meeting these Committees recommended forwarding the request for consideration of approval by the full Board.

**Staff Recommendation:** Information only

#### **History/Background:**

- The release of the Desert Healthcare District and Foundation's Request for Proposal (RFP) Improving Access to Behavioral Health Education and Prevention Services to Children (0-18yrs) and Their Families closed on June 10, 2022. Internally, staff reviewed all applications and hosted proposal conferences with organizations to determine which applications meet all eligibility criteria and which projects best aligned with the identified RFP goals. Based on internal review, these applications, totaling \$1.2 million, will be brought before the Program Committee in July for consideration.
- The Behavioral Health Initiative convened the Steering Committee on June 8, 2022. In this meeting each of the working group chairs presented an update on the identified priority focus areas of strategic development for the Steering Committee's consideration and input.
- The Steering Committee highlighted the need to connect with community partners that have expressed an interest in exploring potential partnerships to expand mobile/telehealth service capacity in the Coachella Valley. Looking into available grants, Collaborative Care Model options while tracking reimbursable code/billing changes being considered by the State of California.
- Stigma reduction strategies presented to the Steering Committee included a media campaign that was completed by the Riverside University Health System- Behavioral Health and Civilian Media focused on the Farm Worker community and increasing access to mental health support services for this community. The dissemination process for this campaign will include a multimedia communication plan for use by providers in the Coachella Valley. This campaign has launched on the Up to Us Riverside site. The campaign content is now available in English, Spanish and is currently being translated to include the Purépecha language. Focus on stigma reduction measures across the Coachella Valley community continues as a component to increasing service awareness and access.
- Workforce development strategies related to increasing the workforce levels in the Coachella Valley include the collection of data to clarify the number of available intern opportunities/slots that can help to support our universities seeking internship locations for their students and retention focused interventions to address existing challenges in this area.
- Policy Development Working Group identified key bills during this legislative session that will have the greatest impact on behavioral health service capacity, workforce expansion and

innovation of Medi-Cal. Updates to Steering Committee will include legislation that would benefit from letters of support from our local agencies as needed to help advance bills toward passage. A longer term focus on Realignment and the resultant Riverside County annual shortfall of \$150 million that needs to be revisited as the county population has grown significantly since the allocation was set in 1991 - 2011.
