



Subject: CV Equity Collaborative: COVID-19 Testing and Vaccine Update

Staff Recommendation: Informational item only

Background:

- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation received \$1.2 million from the County of Riverside and \$500,00 from The Public Health Institute to support targeted community-based outreach, education, and COVID-19 testing in partnership with community- and faith-based organizations that serve vulnerable communities in Coachella Valley, with an emphasis on Eastern Coachella Valley.
- The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach.

COVID-19 Testing Update:

- The CVEC will receive an additional 6,000 at-home COVID-19 tests from RUHS Department of Public Health that will be distributed through outreach events and per request from partner organizations.
- To date, a total of 348 COVID-19 testing clinics resulting in roughly 23,592 COVID-19 tests have been provided at events organized by the CVEC and its partners. In addition, more than 13,012 COVID-19 at-home tests have been provided at COVID-19 testing and community events.

COVID-19 Vaccination Update

- In the last couple of months, COVID-19 testing, and vaccination events have seen a decline in participants throughout the county and here in the Coachella Valley.
- As of August 2023, the Promotoras have initiated phone banking sessions using registration forms to call previous COVID-19 vaccination clinic participants to ensure they have received all of their recommended COVID-19 vaccines and invite them to upcoming vaccination

clinics. As a result, the Promotoras have successfully engaged 621 Coachella Valley residents via phone and texts.

- To date, a total of 426 COVID-19 vaccination clinics resulting in 48, 324 COVID-19 vaccines have been provided to District residents in vaccination clinics hosted by the CVEC in partnership with the RUHS-Department of Public Health, CV Pharmacy, and Borrego Health. In addition, a total of 957 doses of the flu vaccine have been provided since September 18, 2022, at CVEC-sponsored COVID-19 vaccination clinics.
- The partnership with FIND Food Bank established COVID-19 vaccination clinics at the following food distribution sites: Shadow Hills High School in Indio, CA, La Quinta Community Fitness Center in La Quinta, CA, the Palm Springs Convention Center in Palm Springs, CA and Cahuilla Desert Academy in Cathedral City, CA.
- On Sunday, September 24, the CVEC will host the first vaccine clinic at the Palm Desert Mall kiosk. In addition to hosting weekly vaccine clinics, the kiosk will also serve as an outreach post for CVEC partners to disseminate educational material, PPE including COVID-19 take-home tests, and information on the latest recommendations by the CDC and CDPH on COVID-19. A rotation schedule has been developed for the funded CVEC partners to perform said duties.
- In conjunction with community partners including, RUHS Public Health, Rite Aid, and Coachella Valley Pharmacy, we are exploring a potential allocation of the updated COVID-19 vaccine for underinsured or uninsured District residents.

Subject: Mobile Medical Unit Operations

Staff Recommendation: Informational item only

Background:

On May 25, 2021, the DHCD Board of Directors approved \$336,500 for the acquisition of a medical mobile unit and additional operational expenses, an additional \$175,000 stemming from a grant from the Coachella Valley Resource Conservation District (CVRCD). The purchase cost of the medical mobile unit totaled \$170,000.

On March 1, 2022, a Request for Proposal (RFP) was released to find an operator for the medical mobile unit, who would be able to license it as a medical facility. DPMG Health (Desert Physician's Medical Group), which is a 501(c)3 organization of DRMC's Family Medicine Residency Program, applied to the RFP and ultimately was selected to be the operator of the vehicle and provide healthcare services.

On June 28, 2022, the DHCD Board of Directors approved a 3-year NTE \$500,00 operating budget for the medical mobile unit, which was awarded to DPMG Health.

After production delays due to the supply chain disruptions due to COVID-19, finally, on December 2, 2022, the DHCD launched the brand new 26ft. medical mobile unit, which includes two examination rooms, along with a full restroom.

Update

The addition of the medical mobile unit has increased the District's visibility throughout the Coachella Valley and has served as a learning platform for various medical specialties for the Desert Care Network and DPMG Health medical residents. Since the launch in October 2022, 3,327 District residents ranging from refugees, farmworkers, unhoused individuals, and students have received medical care through the medical mobile unit. The provision of these services has been greatly due to partnerships that have been established with:

- Well in the Desert
- Growing Coachella Valley
- City of Palm Springs RISE team
- City of Desert Hot Springs
- Coachella Valley Unified School District

- Desert Sands Unified School District



Staff Recommendation: Informational item

Background:

The Desert Healthcare District and Foundation has established and leads The Coachella Valley Equity Collaborative (CVEC), which has brought together community and faith-based organizations, government agencies (county and state), and local farm owners to address the COVID-19 epidemic and ensure there is a coordinated effort to maximize resources and prevent overlap is services and/or outreach. To date, the CVEC has organized more than 400 COVID-19 mobile vaccination clinics, where 48,153 doses of the vaccine have been provided to District residents.

Research data has demonstrated the need to reach vulnerable populations, specifically older adults and individuals with special needs to ensure they have the same level of access to COVID-19 and flu information and vaccines as other District residents. With this in mind, DHCD staff sought funding opportunities to target these specific populations and were awarded a grant from US Aging.

The grant with US Aging will provide the CVEC and its two partners Vision y Compromiso and El Sol the opportunity to collaborate with senior-serving facilities like senior centers, retirement communities, etc... to host mobile and in-home COVID-19 and flu vaccine events. In addition, partnerships with organizations that serve individuals with special needs like Desert Arc, Angel View, and United Cerebral Palsy of the Inland Empire also host mobile and in-home vaccination clinics.

Update

DHCD staff has reached out to Coachella Valley senior centers and community partners to host COVID-19 and flu vaccination clinics. To date, the following COVID-19 & flu vaccination clinics have been scheduled:

History/Background:

- The District Fentanyl Harm Reduction Awareness Project in partnership with Riverside University Health System/Public Health (RUHS-PH) concluded on August 31, 2023. This project consisted of harm reduction awareness education trainings and community outreach services focused on the City of Indio and its residents. Our subcontractor partner, ABC Recovery Center located in Indio provided these services along with the distribution of Fentanyl testing strips and Narcan two dose nasal inhaler units. Community members received information highlighting the importance of understanding the dangers of Fentanyl, harm reduction strategies, and how to utilize Narcan as an intervention tool during an overdose occurrence. The project report has been submitted to RUHS-PH for their review. This report includes overall numbers served, identified trends and potential for future expansion of this project structure throughout the Coachella Valley (see attached).
- The District Fentanyl Harm Reduction Awareness Project was presented at the Association of California Healthcare Districts (ACHD) annual meeting on September 14, 2023 in Olympic Valley, California. Jana Trew, Senior Program Officer-Behavioral Health and Alejandro Espinoza, Chief of Community Engagement delivered this presentation. This was an opportunity to share our experiences with this project and highlight ways to expand the scope of this work within our healthcare district. The presentation was well received.
- The Coachella Valley Behavioral Health Collective (CVBHC) will be convening an inperson 3rd Quarterly Meeting on Monday, October 2, 2023 at 1:30pm. This Year-In-Review will be held at DRMC Sinatra Auditorium and will provide highlights related to the work of the collective over the last year and the priority focus areas for the next year. 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Partnerships

The **Desert Healthcare District**, in partnership with **Riverside University Health System - Public Health**, created an action plan to address the high overdose deaths plaguing the Indio community by implementing a harm reduction education project. The project sought to leverage existing, local community partners already providing an array of support services and resources to those most at risk for potential overdose and death. The Riverside Overdose Data to Action (RODA) team partnered with the District to set priorities and deliverable areas of focus related to implementation of this project.



Desert Healthcare District (DHCD) was founded in 1948 with the intention

of creating Desert Hospital, the first

public hospital in Palm Springs. Since 2018, when the District and Foundation launched a Behavioral Health Initiative, the Board has allocated \$3 million to support behavioral health services and programs. That was followed, in 2019, with a valley-wide behavioral health needs assessment, commissioned by the District and Foundation. A new five-year strategic plan, adopted by the District's Board of directors in 2021, included a goal to proactively expand community access to behavioral/mental health services and jump started a Coachella Valley District led Behavioral Health Initiative involving over 38 stakeholder organizations.



Riverside University Health System -Public Health works to promote and protect the health of all county residents and visitors in service of the well-being of the community by creating healthy communities, promoting healthy behaviors, and connecting and investing in people. The Public Health department if made up of over 700 doctors, nurses, health educators, nutritionists, communicable disease and community program specialists, managers and fiscal and support staff that implement a wide range of services and resources from immunization programs to overdose morbidity and mortality surveillance. The Riverside Overdose Data to Action (RODA) team partnered with DHCD to set priorities and deliverable areas of focus related to implementation of this project.

The work of **ABC Recovery Center**, located in Indio, California, was a critical community partner with this project. Their team provided the Fentanyl harm reduction education sessions to the community members most at risk for potential Fentanyl related overdose incidences and deaths.

ABCrecovery cen er

ABC Recovery Center has a nearly 60 year history of successfully providing addiction intervention treatment support services to those suffering from substance use disorders including addictions that put the user at a high risk of overdose/death. Their expertise and experience, as a provider of wellness support services across all stages of recovery, made them a valuable subcontractor to implement this project's harm reduction education/training workshops and education sessions as coordinated by the DHCD team. The DHCD team collected and analyzed data as it related to the project deliverables to inform future planning and development to address the Fentanyl crisis.

Organizational Participants

These **four community based organizations** are trusted members of the community and provided ABC Recovery with locations to reach the targeted population and support staff to partner with at outreach/training events.



The **Coachella Valley Rescue Mission** serves people experiencing homelessness, hunger and life challenges through emergency services, recovery programs and community outreach.



College of the Desert is a public community college in Palm Desert, California. COD enrolls about 12,500 students, of which around one third attend college full-time. The college is federally recognized as a Hispanic-serving institution, receiving Title V grants.



Martha's Village & Kitchen is one of the largest providers of homeless and impoverished services in Coachella Valley and Riverside County offering unique life-changing programs based on the nationally recognized "continuum of care model" breaking the cycle of homelessness and poverty.



Coachella Valley Volunteers in Medicine offers medical services at no cost to uninsured adults. As a community safety net, VIM treats the whole person by addressing chronic diseases, acute conditions, preventative medicine, diet, and emotional health.

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PROJECT BACKGROUND

Introduced into society in the 1960s, Fentanyl quickly became a popular intravenous drug. Although legally produced and disseminated in the United States, Fentanyl is distributed into society illegally across various mechanisms including theft, fraudulent prescriptions, and other unlawful distribution methods. Since 2011, fatal overdoses and law enforcement encounters, heavily associated with Fentanyl fraudulent distribution, are trending upward.


Fentanyl is 50 to 100 times stronger than morphine. Similar to Morphine, it is legally prescribed to patients with severe and/or chronic pain patients that do not receive relief from other prescribed opioid drugs. Taking Fentanyl over time can lead to tolerance issues. Tolerance occurs when you need increased dosage and/or increased frequency of a drug to get the desired effects. Increased tolerance impacts fatal overdose outcomes.¹

In 2022, Centers For Disease Control provisional data indicated that more than **two thirds (68%)** of the reported **107,081** drug overdose deaths in the United States involved synthetic opioids other than methadone, principally illicitly manufactured fentanyls (IMFs).²

- Coordinated/scheduled activities, utilizing a network of community organizations that currently serve the City of Indio community, for the presentation of harm reduction awareness education sessions which include how to employ harm reduction supplies in the event of an overdose occurrence. A primary community organization providing these services is ABC Recovery Center. ABC Recovery Center has nearly 60 year of history providing substance use/misuse and recovery services to those in need of support. ABC Recovery is located in the City of Indio and has extensive experience serving that community.
- Targeted community outreach activities consisted of joining community providers, who conduct direct outreach to homeless encampments, in an effort to reach the most vulnerable community members at the greatest risk for a potentially fatal Fentanyl related overdose incident.

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PROJECT DELIVERABLES

HARM REDUCTION STRATEGIES

Harm reduction is an evidence-based approach that is critical when engaging with people who use drugs.

Equipping individuals with life-saving tools, and information to create positive change in their behaviors, can work to potentially save their lives. Harm reduction is a key pillar in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Overdose Prevention Strategy.⁷





ABC Recovery Center outlined key project takeaways and the **Desert Healthcare District** highlighted recommendations to further address the Fentanyl crisis in Coachella Valley.

One on one contact with community members, during outreach activities, afforded the ABC Recovery Center team the ability to support individuals transition into recovery services.

ABC Recovery Center's partnership with Coachella Valley-Volunteers In Medicine – Street Medicine program helped reach and build trust within the unsheltered community.

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Fentanyl testing strips were greatly appreciated by the community. Individuals felt that they could help to mitigate a potential overdose.



Community organization teams were valuable as they assisted in coordinating harm reduction trainings at their programmatic sites to help connect their clients to Fentanyl educational information, Narcan, and Fentanyl strips.

The project team worked diligently to meet the project deliverables. Due to the five month timeline, there were challenges that arose that provided limitations to meeting all deliverables:

- In partnership with College of the Desert, ABC Recovery promoted their training and outreach events; however, students did not participate in scheduled events due to rescheduling challenges, time of year, and limited time for outreach.
- Weather issues impacted ABC Recovery's ability to target homeless individuals because the weather caused many of Indio's homeless to vacate their regular areas.
- The City of Indio had limited outreach events that would accommodate a table or booth, hosted by ABC Recovery, for information sharing.

The project team learned from these challenges and have noted that in order to reach targeted populations, additional outreach would be needed to promote trainings and events.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1 Creation of a Fentanyl Awareness Collaborative, made up of a cross section of local stakeholders, that meets quarterly/annually to generate ongoing supportive responses to high-risk areas of the community.
- 2 Setting up the necessary Naloxone/Narcan State Standing Order status in order to secure and distribute deliveries of harm reduction supplies to support community efforts.
- Collectively seek funding to support the future development of harm reduction programs related to Fentanyl.
- 4 Continued advocacy of Fentanyl focused policy development through legislative activity.

Progress Outcomes:

As an organization, we are excited to report back once again that we are on track in meeting our goals and deliverables for this project. Since the initial kick-off meeting that took place in November 2022, participants have engaged with the SCAQMD team and partners on a frequent basis. The learning modules/trainings have been completed by our 15 members of the Air Quality Academy and they have already received their midpoint stipends.

Goal #1:

Air Quality Academy and Trainings: By Winter 2022, an Air Quality Academy will be established and a minimum of 10 participants will be recruited. Community Health Workers, Alianza staff and community residents will attend the Air Quality Academy trainings.

Progress of Goal #1:

The 15 members of the Air Academy have completed the trainings. The 15 members' residence locations all range from Mecca, North Shore, Oasis, Thermal, and Desert Shores. They are all of different ages, some being more involved in community engagement spaces than others.

Goal #2:

Community Engagement and Education: By Spring 2024, Community Health Workers/Staff will conduct community-based outreach, presentations, and education on:

- -Health effects of indoor and outdoor air pollution
- -Ways to mitigate exposures
- -How to check outdoor air quality
- -Data interpretation
- -Air pollution sensors

Progress of Goal #2:

The modules/trainings have been completed by participants. The modules centered around outdoor air quality, which included: types, monitoring air contamination, effects on public health, AQI, regulatory structure, and AB617 actions in the community. As well as internal air quality and purple air sensors.

Goal #3:

Community Environmental Health Report: Community Health Workers/Staff will share anecdotal experiences and perspectives as community members and trainees in the development of the Community Environmental Health Report.

Progress of Goal #3:

During the training spaces and throughout the process in which participants are having their sensors installed in their homes, we created time for HARC to ask questions to be able to collect experiences from community members and open dialogue around the sensors and how they feel about it.

Executive Summary: Borrego Health is committed to providing and increasing access to healthcare services for those living in Desert Highland Gateway Estates and the surrounding communities. This funding will provide support for a pilot mobile services program and begin to assess the sustainability of a more permanent healthcare program within the community. It is anticipated that 2,913 medical and dental visits will be conducted with part-time mobile services in the community.

1. Collaboration	Through a multifaceted approach, Borrego Health intends to develop a collaborative relationship with the DHG Health and Wellness Committee. The team is committed to participation in meetings as desired by the committee to ensure open dialogue as to the perceptions of health issues. The committee will be informed of all planned schedules and activities on a monthly basis in advance to encourage support and participation. Any changes will be clearly communicated to avoid any misunderstanding.	The Borrego Mobile team and leadership continue to fully engage and keep lines of communication with members of the Desert Highland Gateway Estates Wellness committee to provide updates regarding the utilization of services, activities, and challenges. Although the goal is to meet every month, due to the ongoing transition of Borrego Health into DAP Health, no meeting took place for this reporting period. Borrego and DAP Health Updates: We at Borrego Health are pleased to continue to share details regarding the timing of our transition to DAP Health. In our June monthly report we shared that Borrego Health and DAP Health had set a new tentative closing date of July 31, 2023. It is important to note that there were no complications or issues with the transition and the extended period of time from its original date of June 30 th , was set to allow more time for all Borrego and DAP Health team members working on the transition to provide a smooth process and to reduce any potential tight timelines for each of our employees in the weeks ahead. During this reporting period, Borrego Health's operations and services including our mobile clinics continued in the normal course of business. As Borrego Health prepares to join DAP Health on August 1 st , we would like to share that Rose MacIsaac will not be transitioning to DAP Health as she has accepted a position in an organization closer to her home and family in Northern California. Although we are saddened for her departure at the end of July, we are supportive of her decision as this is something that will benefit Rose and her family. In Rose's own words "This decision has been personal and difficult, and I hope you will understand that this is not about the future of Borrego Health. It is simply
