Health and Safety Code Section 32100.04 specifies that Zones 1, 3, and 5 should hold elections in the same year and Zones 2 and 4 should hold elections on the opposite election cycle

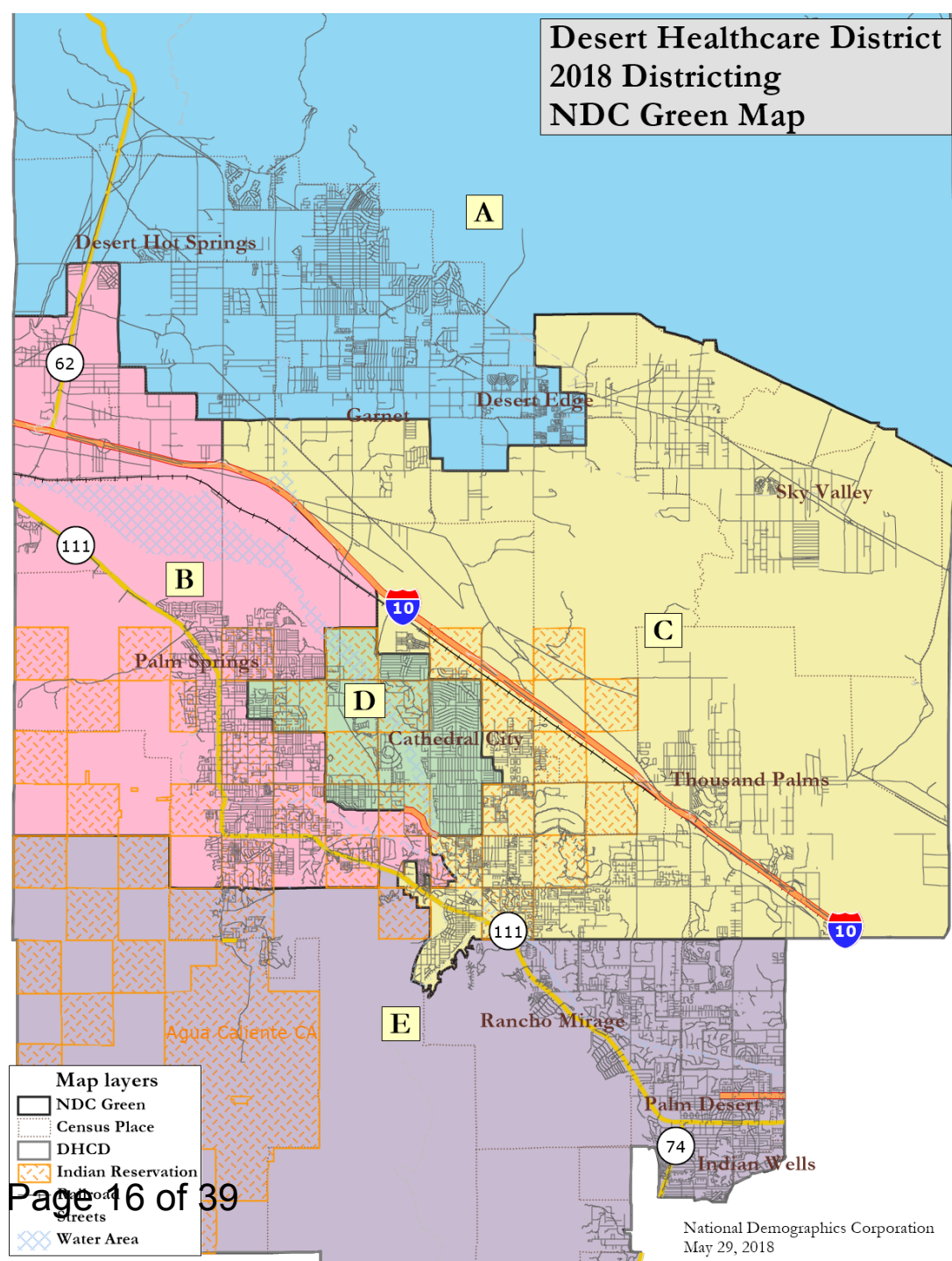

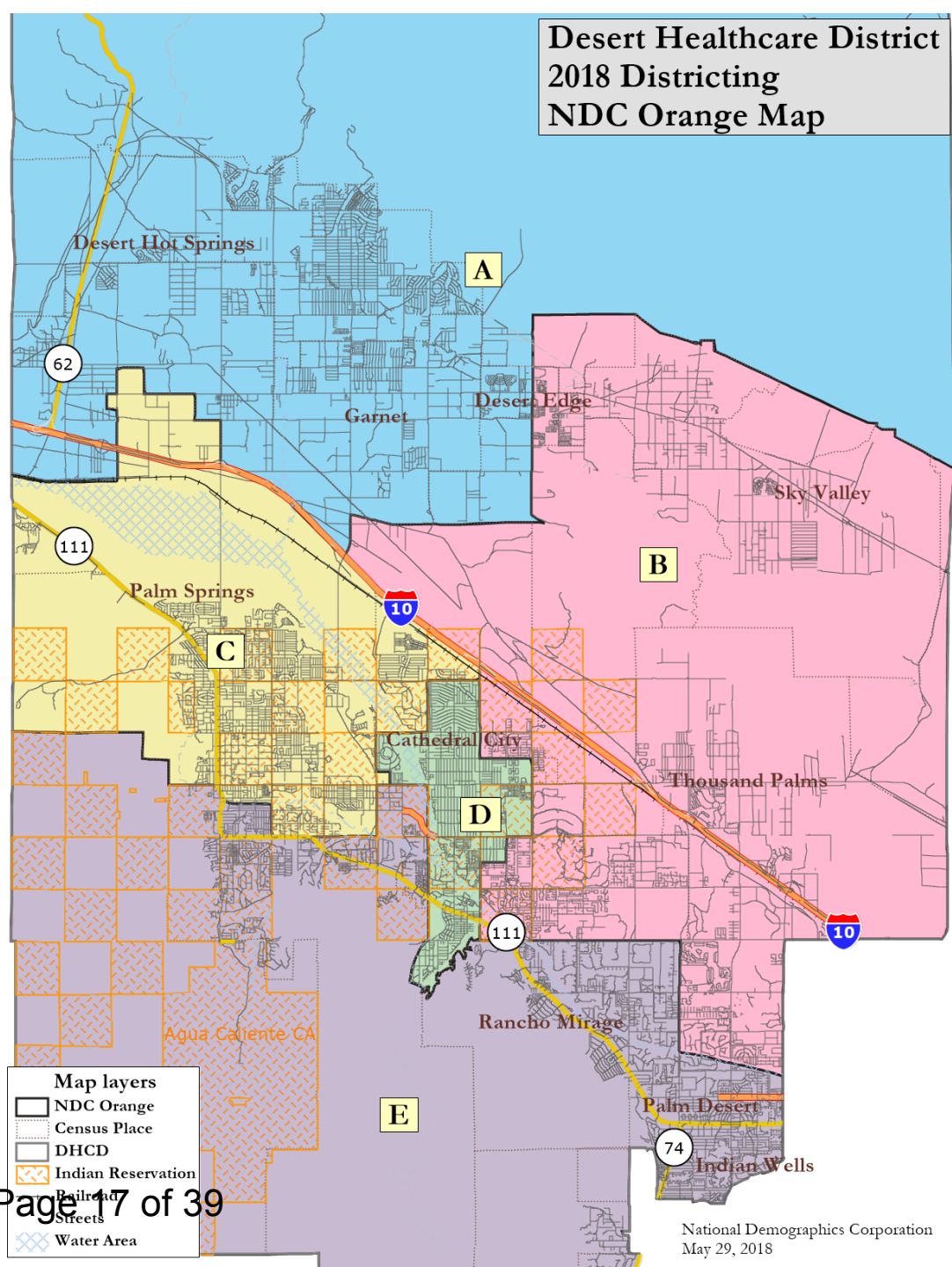

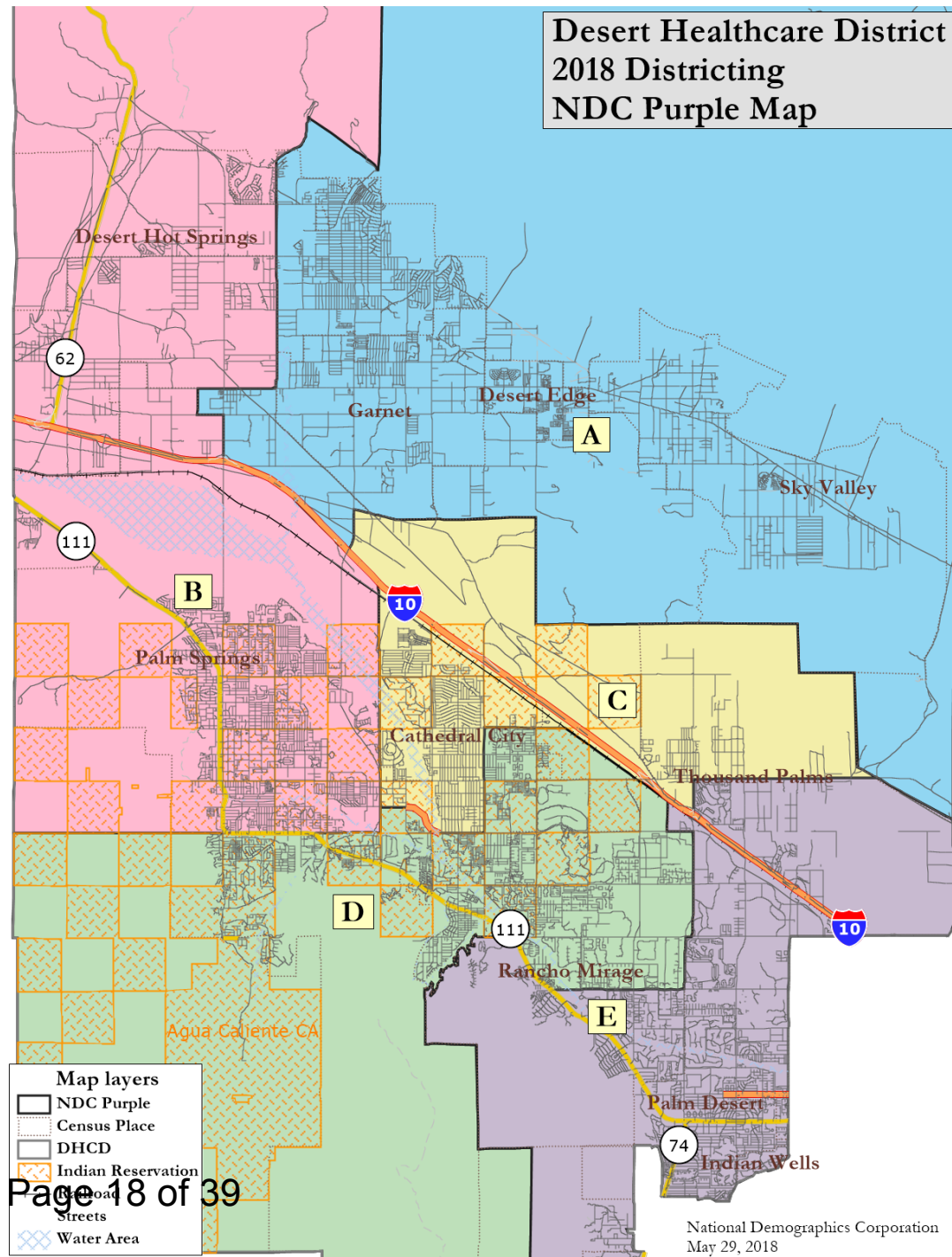
NDC Green Map



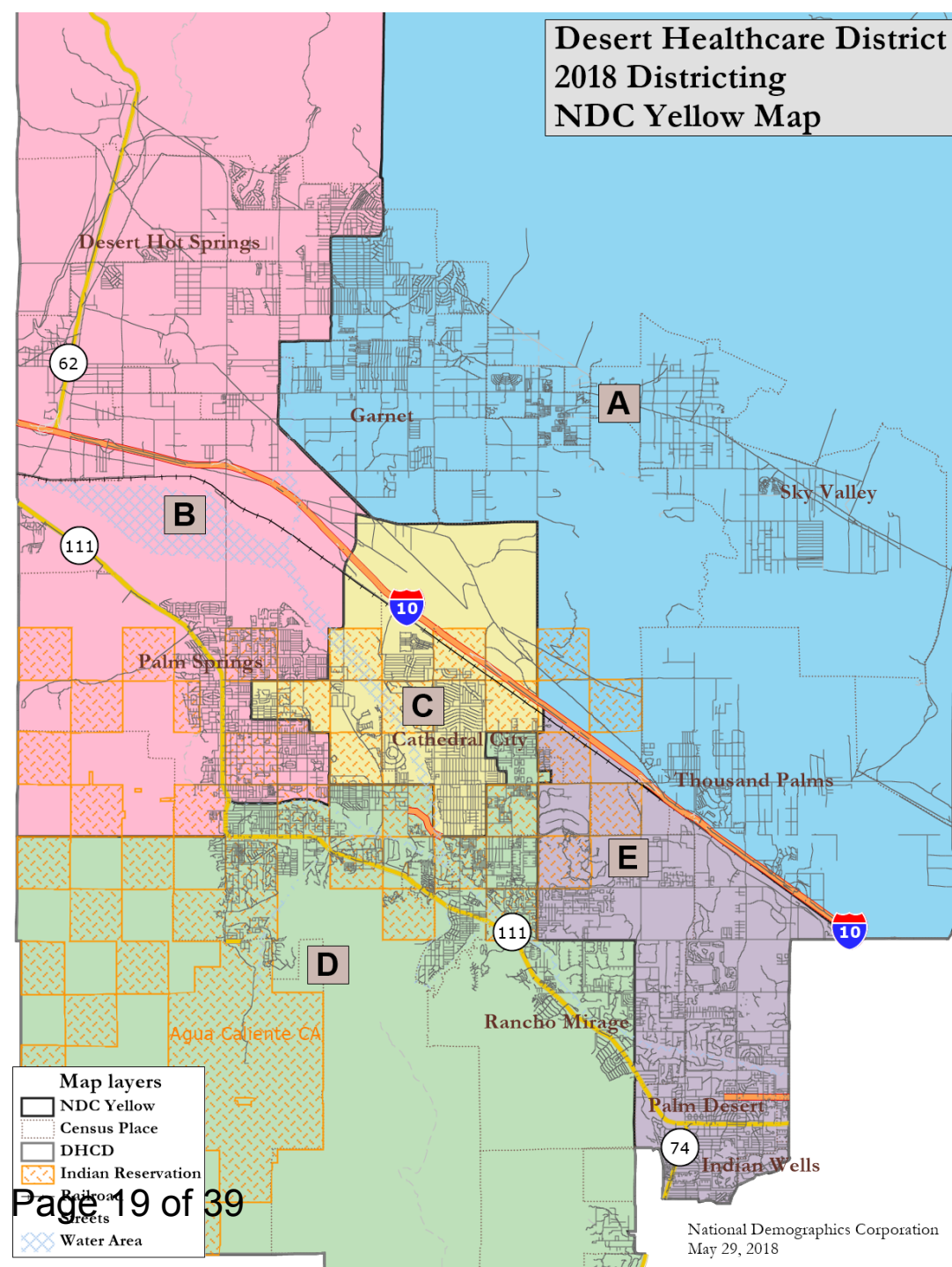
NDC Orange Map



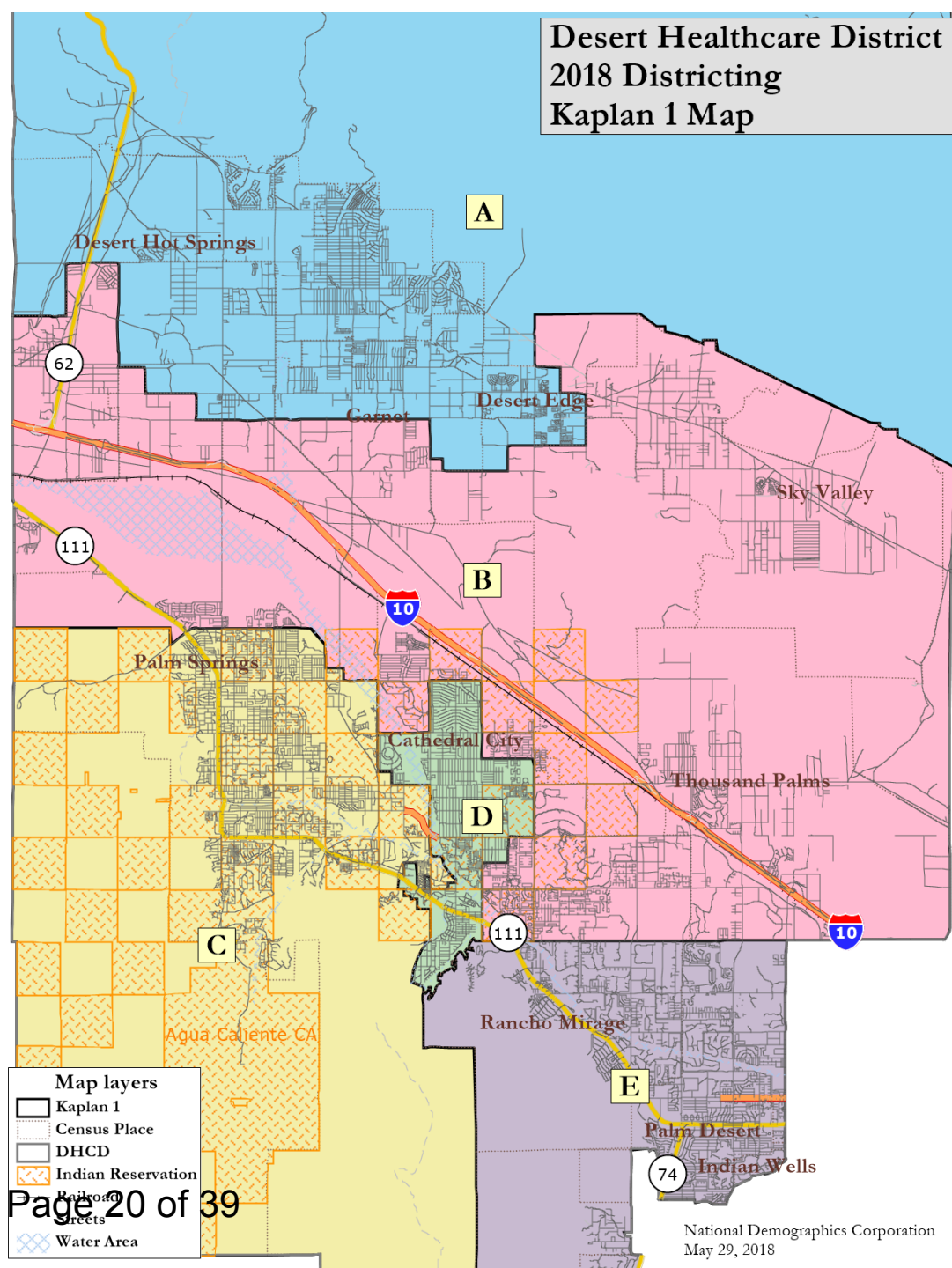
NDC Purple Map

Election Year Sequencing

10

- Once a map is chosen, each zone must be assigned an initial election year (either 2018 or 2020)
- Law requires that the Board have five members at all times. Zones come up for election as current terms end
- Two zones will elect in 2018 and three zones in 2020.
- A move to by-district elections cannot shorten the term of a current Board member
 - Remember that each current Board member was elected at-large and serves at-large until elected in a Zone.

Re-Election Impacts

	Board member Resides in 2018 District	Board member Resides in 2020 District
Board member Term Ends in 2018	Board member can run for re-election in the district at end of current term	Board member leaves the Board at end of term in 2018. Board member can run for Board in 2020, though not as an incumbent.
Board member Term Ends in 2020	(Option 1) Board member leaves the Board at end of term in 2020, and could run for Board in 2020, though not as an incumbent. (Option 2) Board member runs for by-district seat in 2018. If elected, resigns at-large seat (leaving a 2-year, at-large vacancy) and is sworn into by-district seat. If unsuccessful, remains on Board until 2020 end of current at-large term. *	Board member can run for re-election in the district at end of current term

* There is an unresolved legal question whether the Board member must resign to run in 2018, or can run and wait to see if he/she wins before resigning.

Representation in “Vacant” Zones

12

- Three current Board member terms run until 2020 (Board members Zendle, Wortham, and Matthews).
- Those three Board members remain “at-large” Board members until 2020, representing the entire District
- The residents of any zone assigned to a 2020 election remain represented by Board members Zendle, Wortham, and Matthews



Draft Maps Input Sessions

June 1, 2018

The Desert Healthcare District Board of Directors recently decided to move away from an at-large election system for its Board structure and transition to a 5 zone-based election system for the November 2018 election to help strengthen community representation.

In a process required by State law, input was provided by Board Members, District Staff, and members of the public through multiple processes, including at two initial Public Hearings. The Public Hearings were held April 24 and May 8, conducted before any map drawing by the District's consultant National Demographics Corporation (NDC) as a part of the proposed transition to zones.

NDC has created four draft maps based on input from the Public Hearings. The Desert Healthcare District/Foundation (DHCD/F) has published the maps, including a fifth map created by a member of the public on its website for review and public comment. An explanation of each draft map is provided by NDC, including additional information to ensure a better understanding of the maps and zone definitions.

The public is invited to comment and provide suggested changes on the proposed draft maps or create a map of your own. Please note each zone must include approximately 39,400 residents. The maps can be accessed through the following link. www.dhcd.org/Transition-to-Zoning **All proposed maps are due by close of business June 9, 2018.**

The Board of Directors will meet on **June 19 at 6 p.m. at UCR Palm Desert** – 75080 Frank Sinatra Drive, Palm Desert – Building B with complimentary parking in Lot B; and again, on **June 26 in the Stergios Building** at 1140 N. Indian Canyon Drive, 1st Floor Conference Rooms A & B.

At the June 19 meeting, the Board will consider the draft maps, recommended changes, and additional suggestions. The Board will select maps to publish on the District's website for final public viewing prior to the June 26 meeting. It is anticipated that the Board of Directors will adopt a final map for transition to zones at the June 26 meeting.

Plan Descriptions:

NDC Green creates four directional zones and one in the center. Zone A includes Desert Hot Springs, Garnet, and Desert Edge. Zone B is centered in Palm Springs, Zone C includes the eastern half of Cathedral City, Thousand Palms, and Rancho Mirage north of Fred Waring Road. Zone D includes the western and central parts of Cathedral city and the eastern side of Palm Springs. Zone E includes most of the southern areas south of Fred Waring Road, including most of Palm Desert and Rancho Mirage as well as Indian Wells¹.

NDC Orange is another alternative with directional districts. In this version, Zone A includes Desert Hot Springs, Garnet, and North Palm Springs—though entirely north of the city itself. Zone B links Thousand Palms with the northern half of Palm Desert, much of Rancho Mirage, and the eastern edges of Cathedral City. Zone C is entirely in Palm Springs and Zone D entirely in Cathedral City. Zone E includes the southern portions of Palm Springs, Cathedral City, Rancho Mirage, Palm Desert, and Indian Wells generally along Highway 111.

NDC Purple is an alternative that divides no city more than once. Desert Hot Springs is divided between Zones A and B, keeping the eastern unincorporated areas of Sky Valley and Desert Edge with the central part of Desert Hot Springs in Zone A. Zone B links Desert Hot Springs with the northern parts of Palm Springs, including the Desert Gateway neighborhood. Zone C then links central and northern Cathedral City with the western half of Thousand Palms. Zone D links southern Palm Springs and Cathedral City with Rancho Mirage north of Highway 111. Zone E then includes all of Palm Desert and Indian Wells, with the southern areas of Thousand Palms and Rancho Mirage.

NDC Yellow is an option that links Desert Hot Springs and Thousand Palms. This means that Zone A includes the eastern half of Desert Hot Springs along with the unincorporated northeastern area. Zone B includes a large portion of Desert Hot Springs and the northern part of Palm Springs as far south as Taquit Creek. Area C includes all of north Cathedral City, Area D the southwestern areas, including the southern half of Palm Springs, Cathedral City, and Rancho Mirage along Highway 111. Area E includes almost all of Palm Desert and northern Rancho Mirage.

Kaplan 1 (Councilman Kaplan’s map) started with the following instructions, which NDC drew to the best of our ability, given population constraints:

1. Zone one - South Palm Springs heading North following city boundaries to include the 39,400 population
2. Zone two - Cathedral City South heading North following city boundaries to include the 39,400 population
3. Zone three - Desert Hot Springs and the Unincorporated Northwest to include the 39,400 population
4. Zone four - Indian Wells, Palm Desert and the South side of Rancho Mirage to include the 39,400 Population
5. Zone five - North Palm Springs, North Cathedral City, the rest of Rancho Mirage, Thousand Palms and Sky Valley to include the remaining population which should be about 39,400

¹ The Desert Healthcare District includes the communities of Palm Springs, Cathedral City, Rancho Mirage, Desert Hot Springs, Thousand Palms, Palm Desert (west of Cook Road), and approximately 750 residents of Indian Wells (out of a total of 40,000).

Sequencing

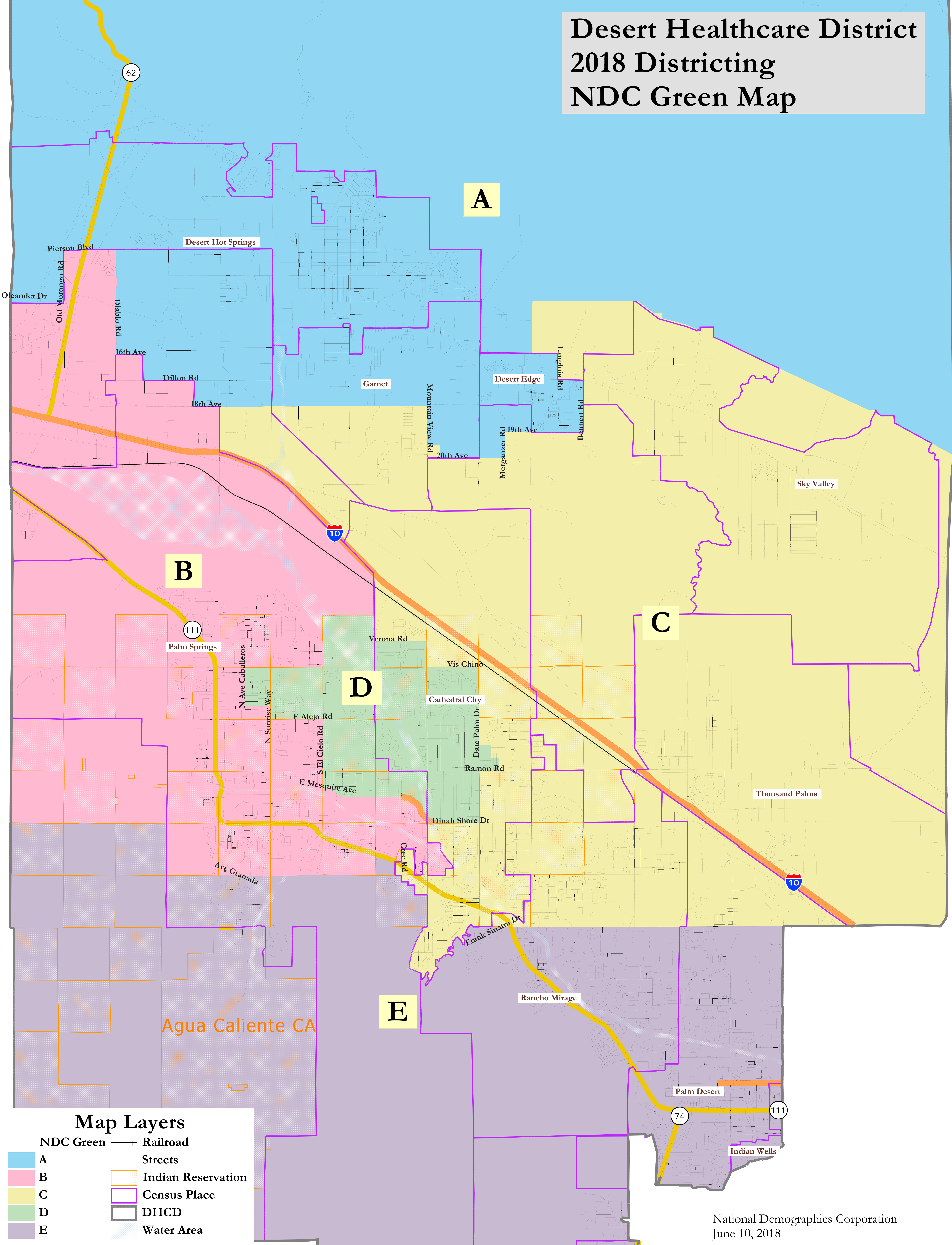
California law requires that the District publish a possible sequence of election years accompanying each draft plan. The Board has the ability to modify these proposed sequences and will decide which zones will elect in each year.

During the transition to by-Zone elections, there will always be five members on the Board, regardless of where current Board members live. All current Board members may complete their terms of office “at-large,” and will only represent a Zone if they win election held only in that Zone². Zones take effect after the first election held in that Zone.

Given the District’s current election cycle, two Zones will first hold election in 2018 and three Zones will first hold election in 2020. NDC has followed the traditional principle of minimizing impact on voters in suggesting Zones with only one current Board member be placed on that member’s cycle. In cases of multiple Board members in a single Zone or vacant Zones, we have listed all options. However, the Board has the flexibility to make the final decision on sequencing.

² It is possible to have two Board members living in a single Zone during the transition. If a Zone containing a 2018 Board member and a 2020 Board member holds its first election in 2018, it will have a 2018 representative from that Zone and a 2020 Board member “at-large” for two years. In 2020, that Zone will not have an election, and the 2020 Board member will be off. In this case, a “vacant” Zone elsewhere will hold their first election for a by-Zone representative in 2020.

Desert Healthcare District 2018 Districting NDC Green Map



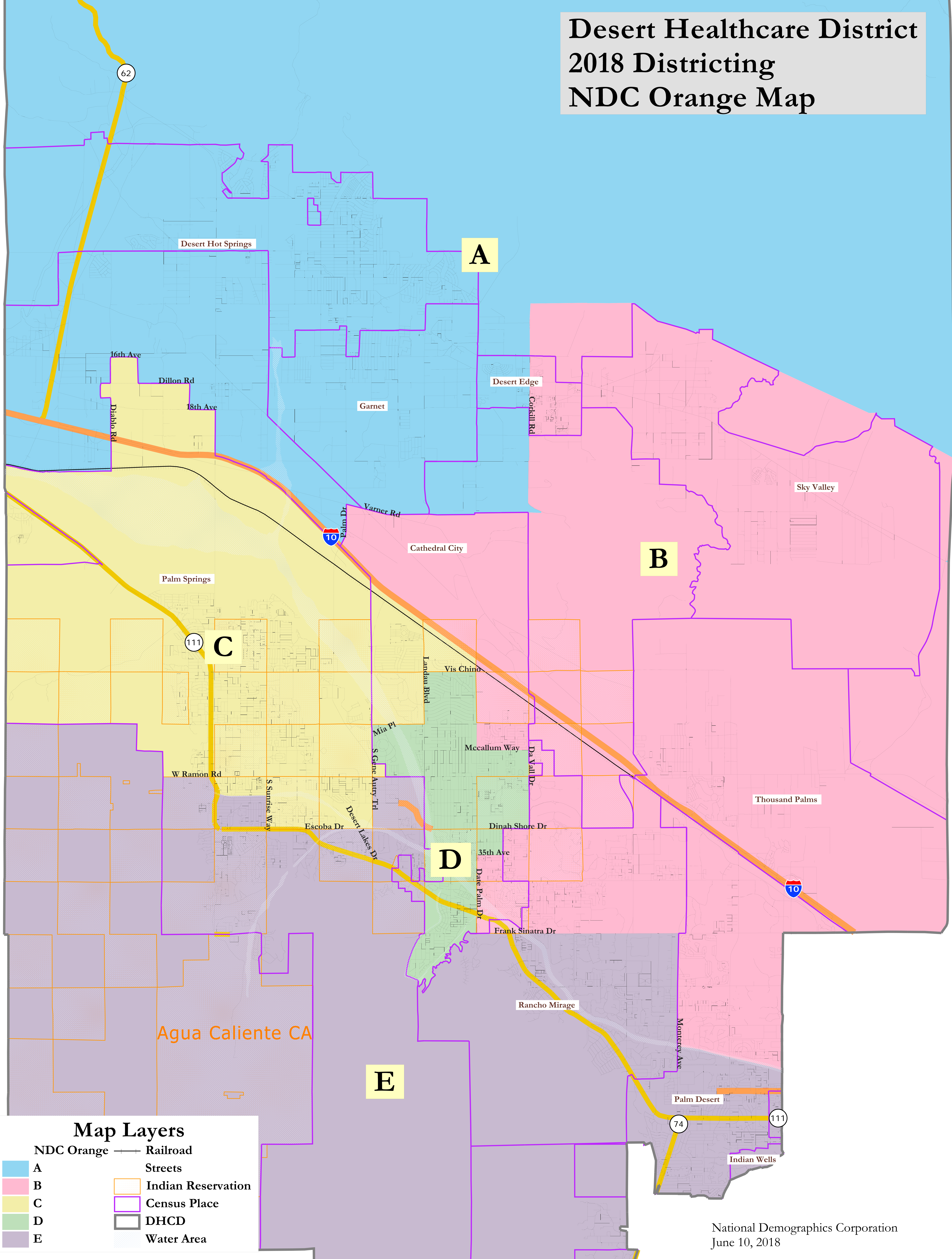

Desert Healthcare District 2018 Districting NDC Orange Map



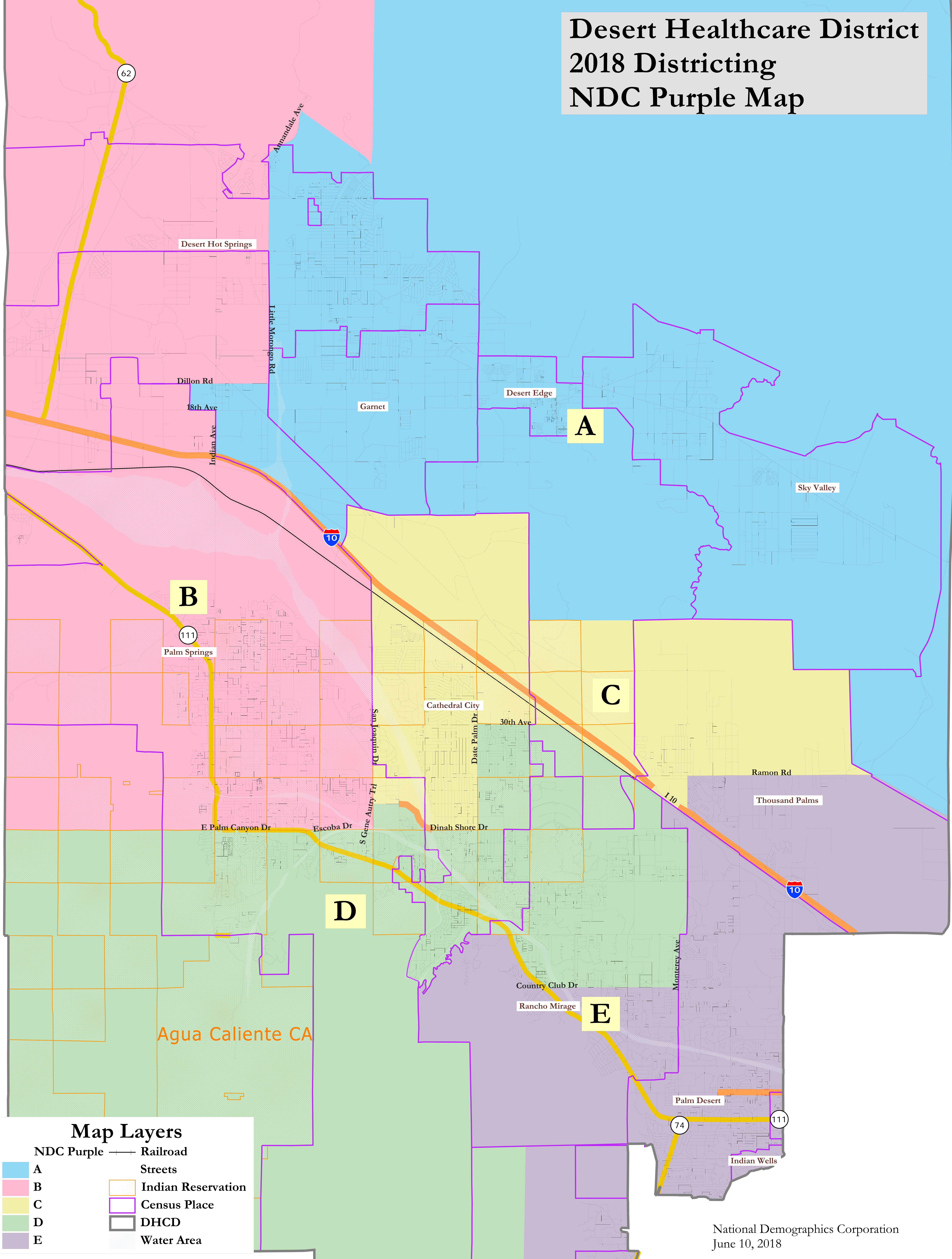

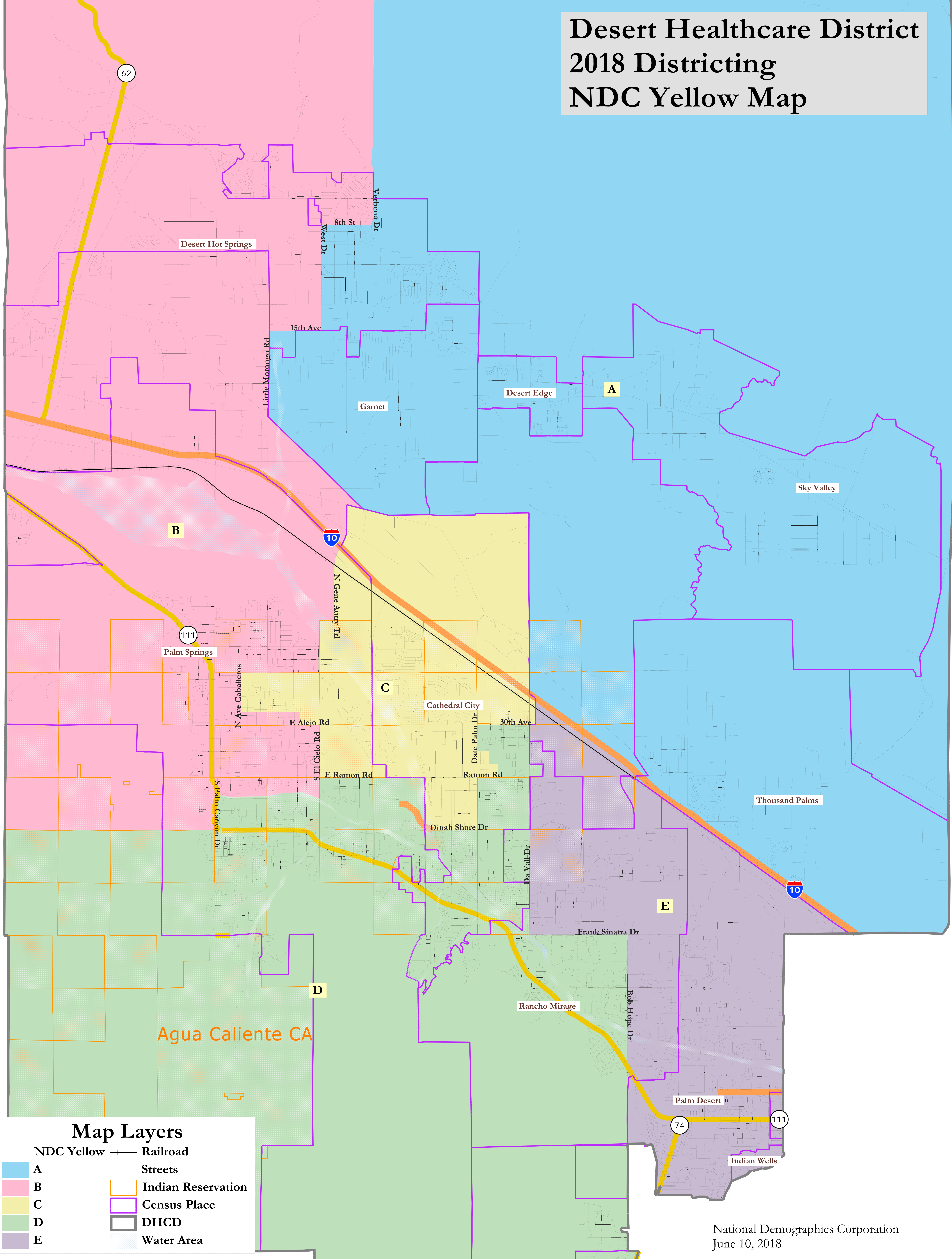

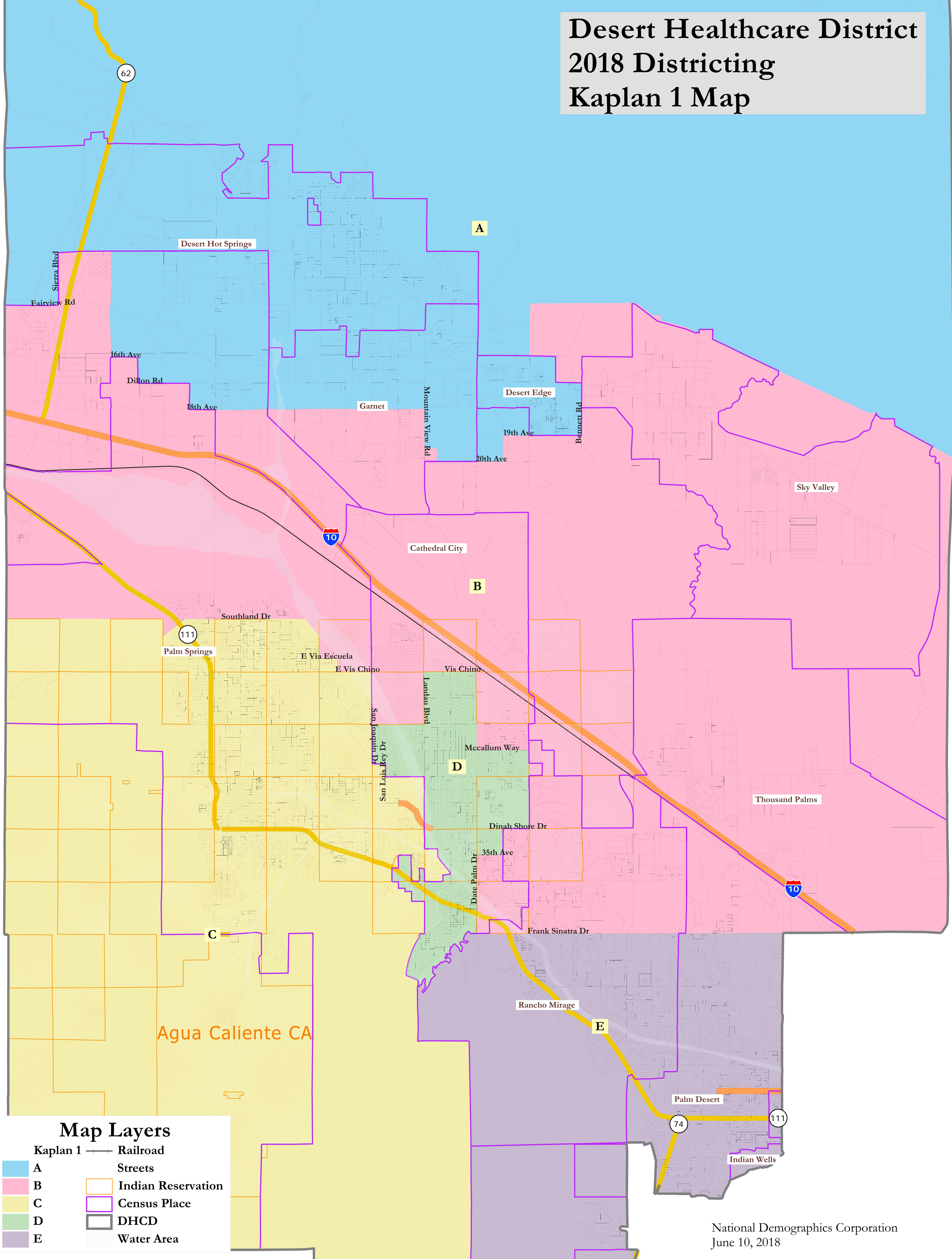
